TAFT'S STRONG PLEA FOR RECIPROCIY

ATLANTO, Ga., March 10.—In a lengthy address at the Southern Commercial congress assembled here tonight, President Taft spoke hopefully of the future of the south and paid special attention to the accomplishments of the congress just closed, dwelling especially on the reciprocity agreement with Canada.

"When we entered upon the negotiations I asked the secretary of state and his commissioners to offer free trade in everything, but this Canada could not grant us, because she has a protective system and she was afraid of the competition of our better organized industrialists."
