ROUSING MEETING AT GEORGETOWN

(Continued from page one)

miserable weather. The time was past for talk, and it was now time for action. They were being tested as they had never been before. The fate of the Empire was trembling in the dust unless they put out their utmost strength. The men of Prince Edward Island came of good stock, no matter whether they were English, Irish or Scotch, they could claim that they came of earth's best blood. Their forefathers had always been ready at their country's call. The Empire had been built upon toil and bloodshed, and they had handed down a heritage such as no other nation had ever received. Would this generation hand it down unimpaired to their children? Their children's children? For generations to come would they try to forget that they had ever had such unworthy ancestors if they shirked this great call.

Speaking of the nobility of the brave women who had sent their fathers, sons, and brothers into the ranks, Col. Campbell said that mothers who might hold their sons back would retain a bitter memory to the end of their lives. What was a man good for if he was not willing to go his part in this great struggle? A woman said "Stay at home and be safe" she was doing a great wrong. There was not one of them who had not more or less fear. The brave man was the "whose soul nobly dares the danger nature shrank from." Dr. Fullerton thanked the audience for attending in such large numbers. Private McLean, he said, was going to take the place of his brother who fell fighting nobly for Britain's cause. After referring to the great power and resources of the British Empire, he told of the great need of men to-day to come forward and fight the Empire's battles.

In Scotland, he said, they had 90 per cent. of the sons of their ministers fighting in France, Flanders or the Dardanelles.

Addressing the mothers, Dr. Fullerton said it was infinitely better that their sons should die fighting for freedom, for righteousness and the ideals of Jesus Christ than that they should live to fulfil the ambitions that the leaders of Germany were placing before the young men of that country to-day. It was the British Tommy—the plain British Tommy that stood between them and the degradation that had been heaped upon the pure innocent women of Belgium. Mothers should remember that their sons were fighting for the honor of women.

His appeal was an eloquent and forceful one. At the close of the meeting fifteen young men came forward amid cheers and signed the service roll. Their names are: Fred Walker, George Walker, Donald Skinner, Stillman Johnson, Alfred Gardner, Frank McPhee, Hugh McPhee, William Fitzgerald, John Dalton, Theodore Christian, Chas. McPhee, Mr. Mitchell, Joseph McCormack, Michael Crawford, Mosey De Gros.

A meeting was also held at Cardigan a report of which is held over owing to the lateness of the hour, but will be published in tomorrow's "Guardian."

HOW TO SAY THEM

Taking pity on its readers, the Daily News, London, Eng., generously throws a little light upon the difficult question of the pronunciation of those curious groups of consonants which the Poles persist in regarding as matter-of-fact place-names. The following list of instructions, if carefully followed, will, we are assured, enable the reader to pronounce the names from the Eastern theatre of war with all the ease and vigor of a native:

"The Polish campaign suffers under the disadvantage of abounding in names of places which cannot easily be pronounced and remembered. This disadvantage is not remedied by the fact that in the bulletins transmitted from Russia the Polish way of spelling is very often discarded in favor of the Russian, which being based on an alphabet different from the Polish, proceeds on purely phonetic principles. For instance, the Polish 'Kalisz' becomes the Russian 'Kalisch' and the Polish 'Shtcherkov' becomes the Russian 'Shtcherkoff'. Thus the reader often meets with what appear to be two different names, which, however, denote in reality the same place.

"In the above example, 'Shtcherkov' will appear to most readers as an almost grotesque succession of consonants hardly to be attempted by a mortal tongue. What they represent, however, is this: 'S' is pronounced 'sh,' and 'cz' is the equivalent of 'ch' (as in 'chakalovsky'). In addition the letter 'w' is pronounced as 'v.' Hence that formidable name reads: 'Shtcherkoff.' The reader will then also understand why 'Kalisz' is phonetically equivalent to 'Kalisch,' and 'Czenstochow' to 'Tchenstochow.' In this latter name it is also necessary to bear in mind that the Polish 'ch' (like the corresponding German) is pronounced as in the Scottish 'loch.' Hence 'Czenstochow' will be pronounced 'Tchenstochow.' The common reader is the Polish 'c.' This letter is always pronounced 'ts,' whether it stands before a soft or a hard vowel or even a consonant. Thus 'Kielce,' 'Pilsna,' and 'Plock,' are respectively pronounced 'Kielts,' 'Piltss,' and 'Piltssk.' On the other hand, the letter 'z' when not associated with another letter (as in 'sz' or 'cz') is invariably pronounced like the English 'z.'

"Along with the 's' or 'c' the Polish 'z' is often associated with 'w,' which turned into 'sh' while the 'z' disappears. Hence 'Przemysl' is pronounced simply 'Pshemysl.' Lastly, the final 'e' is always pronounced (as in 'Kielce')—'Til-Bits.'
