S.; the Bank of London in Canada, London, Ont.; the Central Bank of Canada, Toronto; the Federal Bank of Canada, Toronto; the Commercial Bank of Canada, Winnipeg; La Banque Ville Marie, Montreal; La Banque du Peuple, Montreal; and the Bank of Prince Edward Island, Charlottetown, P. E. I.

FROM Charlottetown to Boston via the D. A. R. The scenery of the Midland link is but a preparation for the vista of the far famed Annapolis Valley. At Windsor we boarded the Blue Nose, Eyer of the Dominion Atlantic line. If the motto of their steamships be as I was informed, "We never lose a patron," the device their expresses might emblazon is, "We ever astonish our patrons." Luxurious coaches, parlor and dining cars, natively attired and watchful attendants and railway officials, and a rate of speed that if one did not remember one was safer on a train now-a-days that on dry land one would speak of as break-neck. And such a panorama as it dashes through! From the bluff at Avonport where the ships prows do obedience to mighty Blomidon, on through the historic homeland of Evangeline, as rich in fruit and produce as it is redolent with romantic and historic associations. Every car window has its interested outlooker and expressions of delight are rife. True their is no mighty, frowning range which after all leaves on the mind a feeling of man's littleness, but a sun-kissed landscape, pregnant with the staple articles of nutriment and odoriferous with blossoms which drop in the fulness of time in apples of gold. At Wolfville one loses the odors of the famous Tantramar marsh which puts on a daintier sheen whenever its two lovers Roberts or Carman wear its sedges. On from Kentville and a guardian range of hills on either hand hold ward over one. That no feature of landscape beauty may be wanting a winding stream anon approaches, anon recedes from the steel threads which link Halifax and Yarmouth unbrokenly. To prepare for lunch at Digby, the Digby Basin contributes its saline air, no appetizer like a whiff of the salt water. Plenty of time here for a lunch at the restaurant counter well supplied and very moderate in charge. Then en avant for Yarmouth. The train lands one on the wharf. One has to book one's stateroom a week or so in advance or you find yourself doomed to nothing more than a very comfortable settee in cabin or smoking room with blankets galore. The steamer invites inspection and bears it. One would think a R. N. E. man was in charge, so clean, shining and ship-shape is everything. I tested the cuisine thoroughly, then under chief steward Hering of the Prince Arthur went through the ship, even the firing room and down where the mighty shaft forged us through the briny at 17 to 19 knots an hour. Then, the luxury of it, a bath, just as comfortable as at home. I viewed with interest the free sleeping accommodation provided second class passengers, roomy and well ventilated. The boat's may be termed ferry boats so marked is their regularity. Huge freights often delay their leaving on time, train connections are not always reliable, but given a start and the boats will land you at your destination as steadily and as promptly as a steam boat.
