"UNIFORM BREAD" FOR THE GERMANS (Canadian Press Despatch.) BERLIN, Saturday, January 31.—"Uniform bread," consisting of half rye flour, about forty per cent white flour and ten per cent barley flour, is to be adopted exclusively in Berlin according to a ruling made today by the magistrats. The ruling conforms with a recommendation of the Bread Commission, which has been investigating the increasing bread shortage that has made itself painfully felt during the last few weeks.

RECEIVES COMMISSION.—Dr. J. B. Brown, D. M. D., who some time ago offered his services in connection with the Canadian Dental Branch, yesterday received notification of his acceptance and has been granted the rank of Captain. THT MAIL BOATS.—The inauguration of the mail boat service at the Capes this season has had a very discouraging start. Owing to the heavy snow-storm on Tuesday the crossing of the boats was quite out of the question and the high wind, snow-storm and lolly made crossing yesterday impossible. Boats with 78 boxes of mail left Tormentine at 9.20 but were obliged to return. The conditions on the island side were so unfavourable that no attempt was made to cross.
