A MONTH WITHOUT THE TELEGRAPH

It is just one month today since the telegraph communication failed this Province. The Government of Canada is directly responsible for the maintenance of this service. For a full month the Government, with the wireless service at its command, has done nothing to make good the loss of the cable. It is very hard for our merchants, shippers, business men, and for everybody, and very shameful on the part of the Government that such conditions exist, but so it is.

Hon. A. B. Aylesworth in his cold-blooded way, in Parliament the other day reminded us that Prince Edward Island had no more population than the city of Winnipeg. That fact is also due to the callous and cruel neglect and broken faith of the Ottawa Government—but let that pass, for the moment. Suppose that the Government was bound to keep Winnipeg supplied with regular telegraph service. Suppose that the service was wholly cut off from January 5 to February 5, and the Government did nothing in the meantime to restore it. How long would Winnipeg stand that sort of thing? Would there not be a commotion in the Red River country equal to that of Riel's time?

We are a patient people, but your patient man, when goaded and driven by long-continued injustice, is not always to be trifled with in this manner. The telegraphic grievance is but one of many injustices and outrages under which we suffer. One year it is two months without a steamer crossing the Straits. Now it is the long covered telegraphic cable. Always it is the irregular, circuitous winter communication; always the double and grinding freight rates. Could even a despotic Czar contrive more certain means to drive a peaceful people to desperation? The Ottawa authorities are sowing the wind, to reap the whirlwind by and by!

FIFTY YEARS OF BRITISH TRADE.

Following are the official figures showing the growth and development of British trade in ten year periods from 1896 to 1906 inclusive, the total including imports and exports added together:

The volume of British trade in 1905 was \$1,863,082,220, and the gain in the last year was therefore \$481,038,740. We Canadians are perhaps a little too much given to "measuring ourselves by ourselves" and omitting to take note of the stupendous progress in other lands. Let us put aside by side the Canadian and British volume of trade as it was in 1896 and 1906 respectively and the gain made by each:

In other words, British trade has gained more than five times as much as Canadian trade in volume during the past ten years. The volume of British trade last year was \$127 per head of population; the trade of Canada \$91 per head. Canadian trade gained last year 80 millions; British trade gained 489 millions, or six times as much.

WHAT WILL THE GOVERNMENT DO?

The coming session of the Legislature will afford a good opportunity for the Provincial Government to place itself in a better light than they now stand before the people, provided they will by resolution, memorial or otherwise reassert our rights on the basis of the memorial of 1903. The news comes from Ottawa that there has been "no correspondence" since with regard to the non-attention so far paid to that memorial, or with regard to the nonfulfillment of the terms and equities of the union with Canada. The people are becoming greatly interested in these matters and are not satisfied with the stand-pat inaction of the Provincial Government.

It will not do to continue this course. We must make progress in these matters or at least be satisfied that the Government to which we have for the time entrusted our destinies are making some energetic effort to put matters in better shape. Sleeping upon our rights will not, cannot, longer pass for statesmanship. This is a friendly warning and an earnest one. The Kensington meeting indicates the present trend of public sentiment in this Province, and we most earnestly hope that the Government will lay the situation to heart. They must energetically take up the question of securing our rights if they would retrieve the situation.

We learn from a private source that Sir Wilfrid Laurier is perturbed somewhat by the growing discontent in Prince Edward Island. If this is true, he also knows full well how to quiet it.

In reply to Mr. Martin on January 30 Hon. Mr. Brodeur informed the House of Commons that his department was not aware that Charlottetown Harbor was open and the weather mild when the Stanley was withdrawn from the direct route to Pictou January 9. The Minister also stated: "The movements of these vessels are left to the discretion of the captains in charge."
