Mallard Duck Found Wearing Unidentified Band

OTTAWA, Canada, Nov. 7.—The Commissioner, National Parks of Canada, Department of the Interior Ottawa, has received information that a female mallard duck which was wearing a flat ribbon type poultry band of white celluloid inscribed "203 Canada," was found injured at Fair Haven, Michigan, on August 21, 1932. Although it was cared for, the bird died of its injuries. Any information concerning the banding of this bird would be greatly appreciated by the Department.

The National Parks of Canada and the United States Bureau of Biological Survey, are working in full co-operation respecting bird banding and in this way much new and valuable scientific information is being obtained concerning our native wild birds. The official bands used in this investigation are of aluminium or copper and bear the one set of numbers for the continent. Private bands are usually difficult to trace and the use of other than official bands on wild birds is discouraged because of the confusion they cause in the Official Bird Banding Records. Full information concerning bird banding may be obtained by writing to the Commissioner, National Parks of Canada, Department of the Interior, Ottawa.

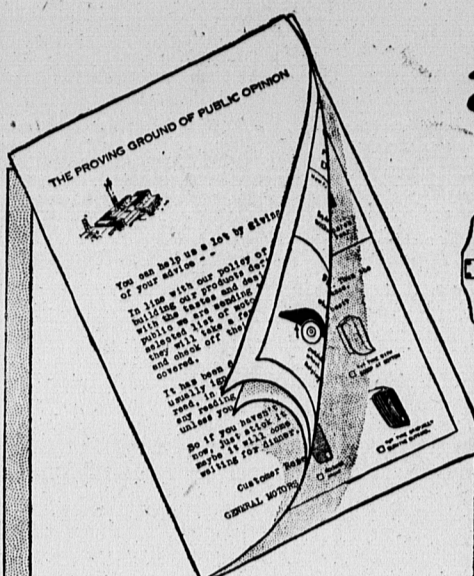

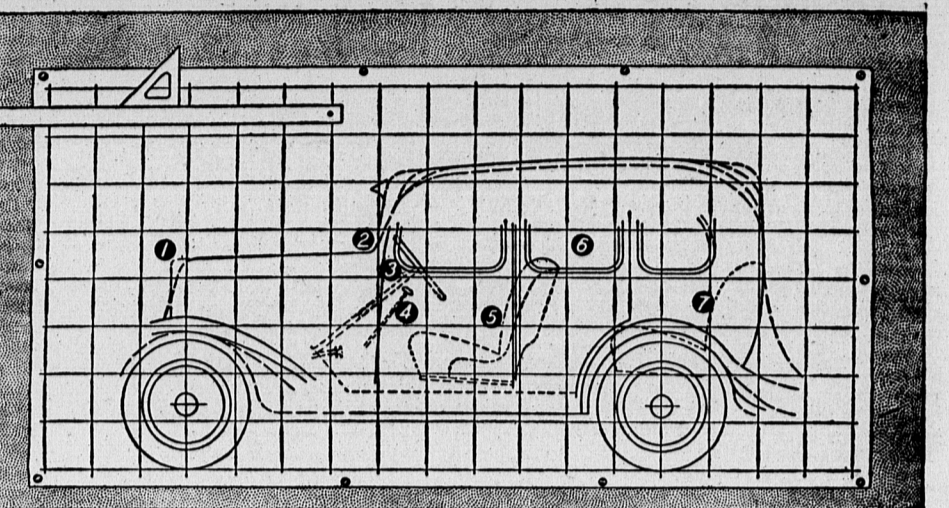

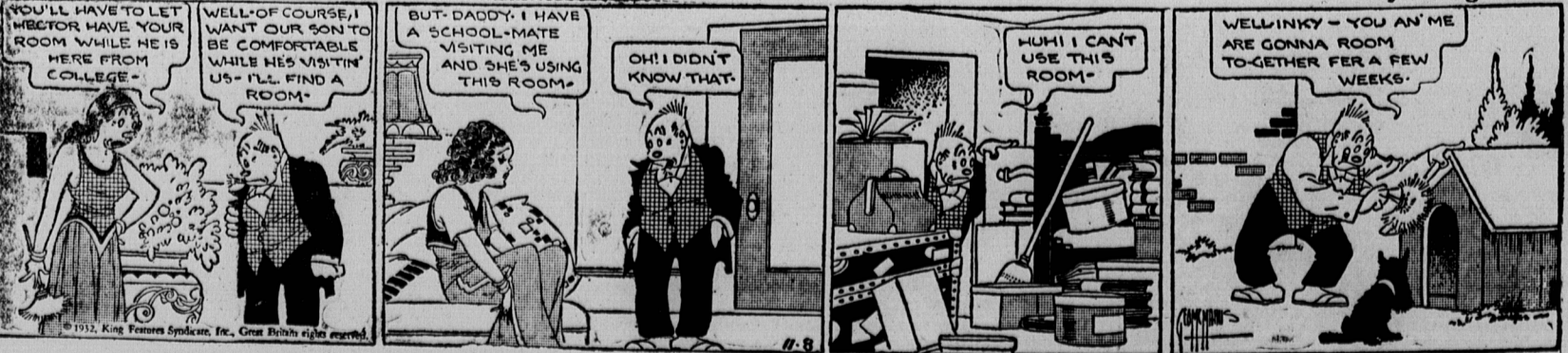

Total 73,745. This is a large reduction from former years. Canada's supply in the same period last year was 48,228 tons.
