In Memoriam MRS. ROSE FLYNN Many, especially of the older people will deeply regret to learn of the death of Mrs. Thomas E. (Rose) Flynn. Her spirit took its flight to Him who gave it between four and five o'clock on Tuesday afternoon at her home No. 76 Sydney Street. Although she had reached the advanced age of 83 years she always enjoyed excellent health until about a month ago when she began to fail and it was evident to the family that the infirmities of age were upon her.

The late Mrs. Flynn was born in Charlottetown. She was the daughter of the late Mr. Michael Riley, a well known resident in his day. She spent her life here and was educated at Notre Dame Academy. In 1844 she was married to Mr. Thomas E. Flynn who predeceased her seven years ago.

All will remember her husband who was for many years one of the finest City Marshalls that Charlottetown has ever had.

Mrs. Flynn when in active life took a practical and interested part in the religious societies of the Roman Catholic Church. She was a kind neighbor, a devoted wife and a loving mother, and all who knew her esteemed her highly, and her many excellent qualities both of mind and heart.

She enjoyed wide acquaintance, but nearly all of her day and generation have gone to the Better Land.

She leaves a family of five sons and three daughters, namely William E. S. L., retired Ticket Agent of the C. N. E., Charlottetown, Frank, at home, Arthur, chief of the United States Transportation Service in New York, and Joe in the same concern, Peter of Lake Steamship Company, Chicago. The daughters are Mrs. Steadman of New York, Mrs. Reuch of Long Beach, California, and Mrs. Malone of Braintree, Mass., and who was at home during her mother's illness and death.

Thus, the family is scattered far and wide. They will always cherish their mother's memory and the most lasting monument to her will be enshrined in their hearts. Major H. P. Stanley Dead in 38th Year WAS WELL KNOWN IN MILITARY, SPORTING AND INSURANCE CIRCLES-BORN IN CHARLOTTETOWN.

TORONTO, June 27. - Major Harold P. Stanley, D. S. O., well known in military, sporting and insurance circles of Montreal, died suddenly last night at the Alexandria Hospital after a three days' illness of diphtheria. Major Stanley, who was in his 38th year, was enjoying the best of health.

His loss, it was said last night, will be mourned by many, particularly by the military, for he was one of the prime movers of the United Services Club, of which he had been president. He was one of the staunchest supporters of the Royal Highlanders of Canada in which he served with distinction during the war. He was keenly interested in the establishment of the Soldiers' Civil Re-employment Department for which he worked in the organization of schools for returned men during the closing months of the war.

Major Stanley was interested in many phases of sport-in boxing, physical training and in yachting. He was a member of the Royal St. Lawrence Yacht Club and the United Sports Club in London, England.

Major Stanley had been in the insurance business for the past ten years. After terminating his connection with Soldiers' Civil Re-employment Department for which he worked in the organization of schools for returned men during the closing months of the war, he was transferred to Winnipeg in 1920, and in autumn of that year he resigned to go into business for himself, specializing in life insurance.

In 1925 he formed with Geoffrey O. Merrill the firm of Merrill and Stanley Limited, and carried on a general insurance brokerage business.

BORN IN CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I. Born in Charlottetown, P. E. I. on May 13, 1891, the son of George and Annie L. Stanley, Major Stanley received his education at the schools of Charlottetown and at the Prince of Wales College. He later entered McGill University, from which he graduated with the degree of B. Sc. For some time previous to the outbreak of hostilities he was engaged as a civil engineer by the city of Montreal.

Overseas he served with the Canadian Engineers and later the Royal Highlanders of Canada. He was wounded on April 9, 1917, and, besides being awarded the D.S.O., he was twice mentioned in despatches.

In religion Major Stanley was a member of the United Church, and in politics a Conservative. He was a member of St. Paul's Masonic Lodge. He was also unmarried.

The only surviving relative is an aunt, Mrs. Florence E. Kent, of Charlottetown, P. E. I.
