Couture notched another one at the start of the second period, but after that the Hamiltons were outplayed and were lucky to hold the score as low as it was.

**Ottawa Smothered The Canadiens**

Score of Eight to Two Was Result of National Hockey League Match Last Night

OTTAWA, Jan. 4.—Ottawa's smothered, Canadians under an avalanche of goals leading by a score of 8 to 2, at the conclusion of the National Hockey League game here tonight. Lalonde scored the first goal but after that the Canucks were never in the hunt. Even the Ottawa substitutes were superior to their covers, and the manner in which the Ottawa's tore through the Frenchmen showed that there is a drastic need or re-organization in the Canadiens.

The game itself was a farcical one, relieved only by the brilliant play of the Senators. Denny, Nighbor and Barragh excelled, and the work of Bruce was particularly good. For Canadians only Corbeau and Lalonde showed any flash of ability. The resounding lack of condition and made pitiful attempts to stem the tide of defeat.

BOSTON, Jan. 9.—King's College of Windsor, N. S., defeated Massachusetts Institute of Technology hockey here tonight 4 to 3, in the first game played this season by either team. It was also the initial ice contest for the new arena, which opened New Year's Day.



**Pete Herman And Jimmy Wilde To Meet Jan. 13th**

LONDON, Jan. 8.—Pete Herman, former world's bantamweight champion, and "Battling" Levinsky, who are matched respectively to meet Jimmy Wilde and Bombarier Wells at Albert Hall, London, Jan. 13, are talking at Thames Ditton, a London suburb, where English boxing enthusiasts daily watch them in their work-outs.

Notwithstanding the recent decision obtained by Joe Lynch over Herman in New York, Herman is being acclaimed here as world's bantamweight champion. Herman and the English promoters are maintaining that only by a knockout could Herman have lost his title; that a fifteen round contest, in a decision had no bearing on Herman's status, and that if Wilde wins here he will be the world's champion.

The promoters of the bouts base their views on rules drawn up at the Paris conference in 1919 of world boxing experts at which the United States was not represented and upon what the English promoters state there is a general understanding that bonus should be for at least twenty rounds.
