Former Redfield Passes Away

The following reference from the Redfield S. D. Observer to Mrs. Van der Linden will be of interest here as she was a daughter of Mr. W. H. McNeill, formerly of this Province: "The death that pulls at the heart strings and makes us realize more than ever that we have not a second lease on life, is our sad story to chronicle this week. We wish we could tell a different story—one of a young mother fondly pressing her first-born to her bosom—but instead that the cold in death, sleeps beneath the sod. Two weeks before Mrs. Vanderlinder's death, she gave birth to a bright baby boy and had recovered, as it seemed, very nicely from the ordeal. Just a moment before her death she was apparently feeling fine. No one happened to be in the room when she fell—her sister-in-law having just stepped into another room to put away some things—but it appeared that she had arisen from her chair to do something and dropped to the floor. The sister-in-law heard the fall and rushed to her. Mrs. Vanderlinder spoke just a few words and expired before medical aid could be summoned. The cause of her most untimely death was leakage of the heart. The remains were brought to Redfield arriving Saturday and funeral services were held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. F. V. Campbell, Sunday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock, conducted by Reverend Hart of the Methodist church. The remains were laid to rest in Greenlawn cemetery.

Margaret Matilda MacNeill was born in Spink county, sixteen miles southwest of Redfield on April 3, 1858. She was the youngest and also the first to leave the circle of eight children born to Mr. and Mrs. W. H. MacNeill. Completing her common school education in the vicinity where she lived, Miss MacNeill attended the Redfield college one year, going from here to the Dakota Wesleyan University at Mitchell. There she made the acquaintance of a fellow student, Oren W. Vanderlinder of Henry, and after three years acquaintance their friendship ripened into love and they were married on June 28, 1911, at the home of her sister, Mrs. F. V. Campbell of this city. The young couple went immediately to Winnipeg, Canada, to make their home, where they resided until the time of her death, December 24th. She leaves to mourn her loss a husband and two weeks old baby, Oren Russell, her aged father of Oakland, California, four sisters, Ina M. Bernard of Donoldo, Alberta; Ruby M. Campbell of this city; Ellabeth Steiner of Mason City Iowa, and Jessie M. Besiger of Portland, Oregon; three brothers O. C. and E. L. MacNeill of Tullare and F. L. MacNeill of Vancouver B. C.

Mr. Vanderlinder spent all except the six years of her married life in this vicinity, where she was well known and where she has hosts of friends to bear testimony that to know her was to love her, for she was possessed of an unusual poise of character, always patient, cheerful, kind and considerate to those whom she mingled with. To meet her was to receive a blessing and inspiration. She was always active in church work and as a girl in college identified herself with the Presbyterian church at Mitchell. After her removal to Canada she and her husband united with the Maryland Methodist church of Winnipeg to which she remained true and loyal until her Maker called her Home. Thus another home is left desolate—another baby motherless—another husband with a great grief, but they who mourn her are not as those without hope, for "she is not lost, but gone before."

At so sad a time, mere words seem hollow, but there are countless friends, whom this paper joins who extend their heartfelt sympathy to the saddened husband, father, brothers and sisters.

(From Our Own Correspondent.)
 OTTAWA, Jan. 23.—The following communication has been received from the Canadian war records office, London: "The past week has been one of normal trench warfare. Normal trench warfare of today however is very different from the normal trench warfare of a year ago. Everywhere the ascendancy of our troops over the enemy is most marked. The evidence of prisoners is the most eloquent testimony to the ascendancy of our patrols while bombardments of the enemy's lines which a year ago would have merited a detailed description as important operations are today affairs of almost daily occurrence. This continual activity of our artillery and infantry has undoubtedly weakened the moral of the enemy and is paving the way for victories to come. A great feature in the life of the men at the front is the training they carry out when in reserve. There is a vigor and a purpose about this training which is quite remarkable. Men who have faced the enemy in battle appear to me it is somewhat cold when we have

realize what training will mean to them and by this training, the purpose of which is constantly planting in the minds of all the sure seeds of victory. 1 room boys are over here but in different billets. 

DISASTROUS FIRE.
 TYNDALL, Man., Jan. 23.—A disastrous fire which totally destroyed the large cut stone plant owned by the Wallace Sandstone Quarries occurred at Lyall last night. The loss is estimated at a quarter of a million dollars and about a hundred men will be thrown out of employment. This plant was the largest cut stone plant in Canada. The Wallace Sandstone Quarries is a two million dollar company operated in Montreal, Ottawa, and Wallace, N. S., and owned by Peter Lyall and Sons Montreal. The origin of the fire is not known. It occurred at a very unfortunate time as the Company was working on the Manitoba Parliament Buildings and there was also a prospect of stone being cut here for Ottawa.
