-SHIPPING AT SUMMERSIDE. S. S. Rycka arrived in Summerside on Friday evening from Capetown with thirty-five thousand bags of potatoes and after completing her cargo here of an additional forty-thousand bags of certified seed potatoes sailed on Sunday night for New York. The cargo was shipped by the Potato Growers Association. A Norwegian steamer of over 5,000 tons tied up on the other side of the Marine wharf on Saturday afternoon, having come from Campbellton, N. B. She will take a full cargo of turnips and table stock potatoes to New York for the Harris Abattoir Company. Two hundred car loads of potatoes are being used to make the shipment. Another vessel is expected there from Orapaud to finish loading potatoes for the Harris Abattoir Company.—S.
