CLERGYMEN ARE ANXIOUS TO GET ON FIRING LINE.

LONDON, Jan. 17.—The petition which a thousand curates in London are presenting to the Bishop of London, brings to a fresh state the question as to whether clergymen of the Established Church (Episcopalian) should be allowed to enlist. According to the established rules of the Anglican Church, clergymen are forbidden to serve in the fighting forces, except as chaplains or non-combatants. The clergymen signing the petition to the Bishop, are of military age and would have enlisted long ago, they say, but for violating the law of the Church.

A discussion has been carried on in the open letter columns in the newspapers in this regard. Opposition to enlistment by the Archbishop of Canterbury and the various Bishops rests on the theory that by ordination the clergyman is dedicated forever to God's service and that the profession of a soldier is incompatible with the priesthood. This finds some support in the Church and the laity, but the more popular point of view is that there are wars often based on righteousness and self-sacrifice for a righteous cause, is one of the ideals of the Church.

THREATENED STRIKE AT GLASGOW SETTLED.

GLASGOW, Jan. 17.—The threatened strike of the seamen in the coasting trade has been settled. The owners have conceded an increase of five per cent. in the wages of the seamen, making their minimum wage fifty-five shillings weekly.

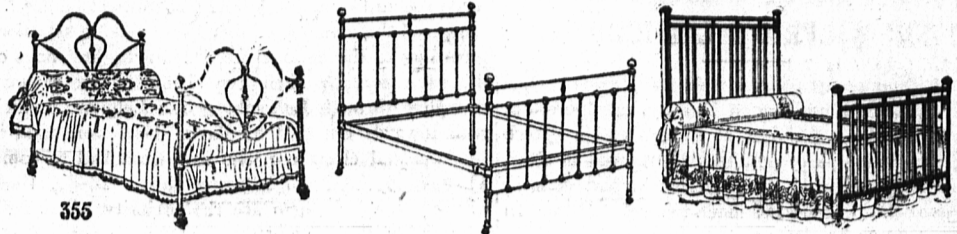
BRINGING UP FATHER

ENORMOUS MUNITIONS ORDERS FOR CANADA

OTTAWA, Jan. 17.—A statement of the shell business that has been transacted in Canada in behalf of the British Government since the outbreak of war shows that there have been orders given to Canada for 22,800,000 shells, and that over 8,000,000 shells out of that number have already gone for-

ward to Britain. The cost of all the component parts required in the manufacture of the total order for shells, including the machinery and assembling, is estimated at \$282,000,000. In addition there have been orders from the war office for cartridge cases, primers, forgings, etc., amounting to \$20,000,000, making a total slightly exceeding \$300,000,000.

The actual shipments of ammunition that have gone forward to Britain from the factories of Canada have amounted to 2,000,000 "fixed" and 6,000,000 "unfixed" shells. The total

output of 8,000,000 shells out of 28,000,000 contracted for, represents an actual expenditure, up to the end of last year, of \$65,000,000. The latest available figures also show that there are some 442 plants engaged in filling contracts at the present time, under the direction of the Imperial Munitions Board.
