**ABEGWEITS SCORE DECISIVE VICTORY OVER 'MILLIONAIRES'**

**Island Champions Work Hard to Win 5 to 1 Verdict—Sydney Display Dashing Hockey in Every Period of Set-to.**

Sweeping down on the attack with a speed and stickhandling ability that would have done credit to the Allan Cup holders, the Abegweits tucked away a 5 to 1 defeat over the Sydney Millionaires last night in the second, and one of the best games played this season.

In that respect the Abegweits were superb.

The forwards on both sides were great, lead by Gordon of the Abegweits and "Bricky" Dunn of the "Millionaires". These puck-chasing fiends showed class all the way assisted by "Bricky's" captain, Bates and Libbus, and McEachern, Campbell, Prowse, Cox, Cronin and Prowse of the Abegweits. It was a game scintillating with brilliant stickhandling and skating throughout and Sydney have nothing to reproach themselves for, notwithstanding their 5 to 1 loss.

That the red and black wearers were out for a decisive victory was a foregone conclusion, this was conspicuously apparent in the third session for the Abbies played hockey as they never played before, with every man working in machine-like precision. Each player had a certain duty to perform and every individual proved worthy of the confidence implanted. It was a battering and rip-tearing twenty minutes and the Cape Bretoners stood up under the barrage thrown over their dynamic hockey ability and spirit stood them in good stead as the Island speedsters were determined to get out in front—far enough to make the going safe. **Market**

MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 9.—The local cash grain market today was stronger and prices at the close were marked up 1 cent per bushel with a slight improvement in the demand and a moderate amount of business done.

There was a slightly better feeling in the Montreal market for spring wheat flour but there was no marked improvement in the demand with little business done and prices unchanged. The local hay market remains unchanged prices being steady with a small trade passing. There was no further change in the condition of the market for strictly fresh eggs, prices being steady with business done in only small lots. On the other hand the market for storage eggs continues weak and prices were steady tending towards a lower level there being a further decline today of 1 cent to 2 cents per dozen. Sales of extras were made at 31, firsts at 25, and seconds at 20 cents per dozen.

A steady feeling prevails in the market for Quebec potatoes and prices show no change. A moderate amount of business continues to be done in most lines of mill-feed and a steady feeling prevails in the market with prices unchanged. The local butter market was rather larger today with a firm undertone. Prices, however remained unchanged. The cheese market on the whole was very quiet today with a restricted demand and prices unchanged.

of our existing agricultural population. While there was a considerable flow of immigration into Canada, we have not gained in population, for many of our own people have left the country and taken up residence elsewhere. Naturally I am interested especially in the province of Prince Edward Island, which is of course more familiar than I am with other parts of the country. Today in that province instead of a maximum population of 110,000 which we had at one time, we are reduced to something over 80,000. In other words about one person out of every five of our population has left the province, and the result of that immigration is very serious, as it would be anywhere. We have certain charges to take care of and where five persons used to bear the burden of taxation at one time we have now only four to carry it. It is therefore impossible to lighten that taxation; our expenses are heavier and we have fewer people to shoulder the burden. At any rate we hope that in connection with this plan for the emigration of our people out into Canada we shall not be blessed or cursed if you will with some of the schemes from which Canada has suffered in the past. If we do not have industries what is going to happen to us? If we have to continue to trade with countries which put high tariff walls against us and if we do not keep up some protection for our industries, where are they going to find a market for their products? We would very soon be in such a position that there would not be any market for our raw materials at home and so employ Canadian labour and create a home market then it seems to me that the prospects of Canada ever becoming the rich and prosperous country that nature intended her to be very poor.

Today we are exporting raw materials that should be manufactured at home—our minerals, our wood and other products. We are sending them abroad to be manufactured to the detriment of our industrial population, and
