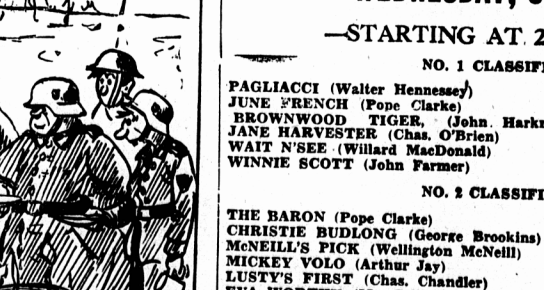
Cab Calloway Band Plans Arouse Interest
