

Notes By The Way

The volume of motor traffic from across the United States boundary into Canada has rapidly increased in recent years.

The Parks Branch of the Department of the Interior estimates that this motor traffic coming from abroad represents an expenditure of \$108,000,000 in Canada.

It is of interest to note the widely different numbers of these vehicles entering the various Provinces. Ontario quite naturally has the largest number, 537,283 in all.

Various causes have tended to limit the motor-car traffic between the States and the Maritime Provinces, the chief of which has been her immemorial custom of "turning to the left."

The intention is still apparent to change the rule of the road in Nova Scotia at the next meeting of the Legislature, which will be in time for most of the tourist trade of next year.

And yet both necessity and general convenience demand uniformity throughout the Maritime Provinces especially and throughout the Dominion as well in such matters.
