Imposing on Grandma

Care of Children is Mother's Job, Not to Be Wished on Others

DEAR MISS DIX: I am a young woman, only 28, and have two children. Of course, like other youngsters of our age, my husband and I would like to step out and have a few good times, and especially do we long to do this now as he is soon to go into the service, but our difficulty is what to do about the children.

Do you think it is asking too much of Grandmas to give us a lift once or twice a week?

ANSWER: It all depends upon Grandmas' age and health. If she is very old and feeble, of course, you could not expect her to become a baby-sitter, but if she is well and strong and anywhere under 70, she should have a hearty and be willing to give even a daughter-in-law a hand with her hard job.

But, on the other hand, you must realize that taking care of her own children is a mother's job, and that she hasn't a right to dump it on anybody else.
