Pints for the Motorist

STEERING IS UNCERTAIN

C. H. M. Asks: Can you tell me what makes the front wheels of my car wobble when going over a piece of rough road at a slow pace? When this happens, it is almost impossible to control the steering without almost stopping the car.

Answer: Your front wheels may be cut of line. They should be nearly parallel, but not quite, for they should be about 3-8 inch closer together when measured in front than when measured in the rear. You can set them thus by adjusting the length of the tie-rod. Looseness may have developed in your gear, through wear of the knuckle-bolts, the pins and forks at the ends of the tie-rod or at the ends of the steering-connection rod (drag-link). Adjustment is possible at the last named point, but replacements will be required at the others. With your wheels aligned properly and lost motion speeded, your steering ought to be all right. Be sure that your front springs-clips are tight.

OXYGEN DECARBONIZING

C. P. writes: The cylinder-head of my truck engine is not removable. Will the use of the oxygen method to remove carbon, injure the cylinders or pistons? Does carrying the oil-level too high in the crank-case tend to increase carbonization?

Answer: There is no risk in using the oxygen method, if it is applied correctly. If the oil-level is so high that it increases the rate of splashing, produced by the connecting rods will permit this engine enter the combustion chambers excessively, it will increase the tendency toward carbonization.

ENGINE OPERATIONS FOR MAXIMUM POWER

S. E. G. asks: Outside of "doping the gas," what will get the most power and speed out of a Ford? How about the use of four valves for each cylinder?

Answer: Larger valve areas and the use of lighter pistons and connecting rods will permit this engine to run faster than it can as originally built and thus give greater output. A four-valve system is advisable under these more saving speed conditions and perhaps a high tension magneto in place of the regular ignition system. "Doping the fuel" has little effect upon engine output. A four-valve-per-cylinder head in creases engine power by enlarging the total valve areas and special cam-shafts giving a better valve setting for high speeds are obtainable. Counter-weighting the crank-shaft may increase the power at high speed somewhat. Please do not understand us that we recommend these alterations of a Ford engine. We are only answering your question. 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"MYSTERY TOWER" BUILT, BY CANADIAN

LONDON, Sept. 16.—To H. A. Cliff, a Canadian engineer, is given the credit for the construction of "Mystery Towers" built to order of the British Admiralty for defence purposes during the war and one of which was towed yesterday from Shoreham to Portsmouth. It will be used there chiefly as a mark for navigation, but originally, it was one of sixteen, between which anti-submarine nets were to have been spread and which were to be crowded with powerful searchlights. These towers are erected on ships of ten thousands tons each, but after being floated to their new positions their air spaces will be filled with concrete and they will be allowed to settle on the bed of the ocean.
