The Breeder's Gazette, of Chicago, gives quite an interesting account of the Xmas Fat Stock Show. This is an annual exhibition of cattle sheep and swine, and perhaps is the greatest of its kind held in the world when the number of the animals exhibited their quality and prices are considered. All the best breeds, Short-horns, Herefords, Aberdeen, Angus and their grades and cross-breeds were well represented. After describing the excellent qualities of the short-horn steers "Hobson," "Duffer," and "Cumberland Chunk;" the Herefords "Old Times," "Prospect" and "Apollo" and the Aberdeen Angus "Good Times" and "Advance" and some other good grades and cross-breeds. The Breeder's Gazette goes on to say: "Well may Aberdeen Angus breeders believe that there can be too much of a good thing. They wanted only one champion; they had two, that is if Advance had been out of the way Good Times would have made his way to the "championship." The yearling steer Advance gained the sweepstake prize over all breeds and ages. He weighed 1430 lbs and sold by public auction for \$1.30 per lb live weight, costing his purchaser \$2,145. His owner received in addition to this sum \$300 in prizes from the Association. He was purchased by a New York meat dealer to be slaughtered for the Xmas market. The cattle were judged by an expert brought from England for the purpose. Mr. John Richards of Bideford is particularly fortunate in having a fine herd of Aberdeen Angus cattle which were on exhibition at our fair in Charlottetown last September and which were much admired for their size and symmetry.
