"Rune Stone" Centre Of Controversy



Here is a photograph of a large boulder found at Sandy Hook, Manitoba, said to be inscribed with three feet high and three feet in width, was discovered by A. H. Althaus brought more facts. Twenty letters from an ancient language of Lake Winnipeg at Sandy Hook, 45 miles north of Winnipeg. It bore markings which were declared to show that adventurers from Iceland or Norway had their way through Hudson Bay into Manitoba in 1492. Taking their cue from laboratory of the "Kensington Stone" at Kensington, Minn., the markings were identified by Prof. Roland as Runes, the same as believed to have been cut in the Sandy Hook stone.
