At the Marine Wharf—The C.G. S. Rouville arrived here Saturday from Quebec after serving lights on the Anticosti Islands. She will leave here Thursday on Fog Alarm Construction work for St. Mary's and then to the Straits of Belle Isle. The "Rouville" is a new vessel to this port but is quite an old timer, having seen considerable service in Government work. She is a wooden boat of some 200 tons, specially built for Hudson Bay Service, carries a crew of twenty-two men, and is commanded by Capt. O. Mercier, of Quebec.

Hints for the Motorist

OCCASIONAL MAINTENANCE AT TENTIONS

Do Not Underestimate Their Importance, Because of Their Frequency. In addition to those facts, which the proper maintenance of a car requires at rather short and regular intervals, there are many others which are only occasionally necessary and which are thus likely to be forgotten entirely, but which nevertheless of importance. Among these are the following:— Tightening of the bolts which secure the body to the frame and which, in time, develop slack under the fearful strains to which they are subjected, with the production of disagreeable squeaks and rattles. All such fastenings should be gone over at least annually. Leather upholstery is subjected to severe wear, is more or less exposed to the weather and should be given a treatment with some reliable leather dressing, to prevent it from becoming prematurely shabby. The same conditions apply to the top, which seldom receives attention when a car is washed. After removing as much of the dirt from outside and inside surfaces as possible with a stiff, clean brush, a mild soap suds may be applied and thoroughly rinsed off, and on the outside, a top dressing known to be adapted to the top material may be used. The spring clip bolts which are self thought of, but as these fasten the springs to the axles, and when they loosen, they will cause the spring leaves from being overstrained and broken, it is essential that they should be kept firmly tightened. The cotter nuts should first be loosened, then the holding nut tried for tightness and the check nut again set securely. The spring leaves themselves must not be allowed to rust together, but their abutting surfaces must be lubricated, so that they shall be free to slide together as they bend in service. One method of doing this is to clean the edges of the leaves and the cracks between them thoroughly with a stiff brush and then to apply heavy oil with a clean brush to the edges of the leaves, allowing it to work in for a while and then wiping of the surplus. Spreading the leaves apart with a screw driver or special spring spreader and inserting thin plates of grease between their surfaces with a case knife blade is a more thorough but more laborious method.
