## WORK OF FIRST PICTOU PASTOR TO BE RECALLED

Maritime Presbyterians Plan To Celebrate 150th Anniversary Of Rev. Dr. James McGregor's Arrival.

PICTOU, N. S., Feb. 21.—(C.P.)—Probably the strongest Presbyterian community in Canada, Pictou County will celebrate next September the 150th anniversary of the arrival of Rev. James McGregor, D. D., who for more than 40 years upheld the banner of Presbyterianism among his flock and planted the seed out of which grew many of the leading churches, not only in the county but in the Maritime Provinces.

Dr. McGregor was born in Perthshire, Scotland in 1788. He arrived in Nova Scotia on July 17, 1786, when he was but 17 years of age, a stranger in a pioneer land but fired with the spirit of the Covenanters of his native heath. He had had some experience in ministerial work in Scotland, he was a "good scholar and a sound theologian" and his knowledge of the Gaelic was accurate.

He landed in Halifax after a voyage of 37 days and immediately proceeded to Pictou where he arrived on Saturday, July 21. The following day he preached his first sermon in a barn near the present town. His morning sermon was preached in English, his evening message given in Gaelic.

For nine years he was the sole minister in Pictou County, preaching, visiting, travelling, on snowshoes in winter, by canoe in summer. His congregation was widely scattered and his labors extensive.

A man of much natural ability, he had moreover enjoyed the benefits of a college education. From the beginning of his work he made the establishing of schools and the education of the people second only to the preaching of the Gospel. In this he was ably aided by his colleague, Rev. Duncan Ross, also a university graduate.

In 1803 a third minister arrived in Nova Scotia, Rev. Thomas McCulloch and it is he has been said of him that no man ever lived in the province who exercised a more

potent influence on religion. From the day of his arrival he became a power in educational matters and founded Pictou Academy, famous over the American continent for the number of illustrious graduates.

Pictou County has given eight college presidents to Canada, more than any other single county in the Dominion has contributed. Few of its educators have attained great eminence but a large number have made a commanding place for themselves in the educational, literary and scientific world.

The Church in Pictou County flourished as the years passed on. Parishes sprang up and extended. New ministers came from the Old Country to administer to the people. Finally in 1817, the Burgher and Anti-Burgher Churches were united and the new body assumed the name of the Presbyterian Church of Nova Scotia.

A Synod was formed and divided into three presbyteries. With the union productive of much good, it became apparent that the Church must look elsewhere than Scotland for the training and educating of a native ministry—the first Presbyterian Theological School in Canada. Seven years before a Bible Society had been organized in one of the County's parishes, the second in the province. The Synod itself brought in the first printing press in the county.

In March, 1836 death came to Dr. McGregor after 44 years of faithful and devoted labor. He had lived to see the congregation of which he was the original pastor grow and develop into six congregations with a settled ministry, a Presbytery and a Synod organized to conduct the business of the church, an academy and train ministers, and the cause of Presbyterianism firmly established not only in Pictou County but in the Maritime Provinces.

Her funeral took place on the afternoon of Thursday, Feb. 6th, in the Presbyterian Church and cemetery at Lot 14 and was, despite the cold blustery day well attended. The services at the house church and grave were conducted by the pastor, Rev. Edwin J. White, assisted by Rev. A. H. Hart Davies rector of St. James Episcopal Church, Port Hill. At the church Rev. Mr. White gave a fine address speaking words of comfort to the grief stricken parents and friends. The pall bearers were: C. H. Montgomery, Wyman Yeo, Gerard MacArthur and John Yeo.
