I beg to announce that I will be a candidate for the Mayoralty at the coming election, February 15th, and take this means of soliciting your support.

Four years ago, the citizens of Ward five honored me by electing me as councillor; at that time I promised that if elected, my efforts would be directed towards the improvement of our streets; the members of the City Council honored me still further by selecting me as Chairman of the Street Committee, and during my term of four years in this capacity, we have put down three and one-third miles, or 60,000 square yards of paved streets which are the equal of any in America, and it is a pleasure here to note that the cost per square yard has been lower than that of any City in Canada.

Whether I have carried out my pre-election promises or not is for you to say.

I believe good streets are one of the best assets any City can have, and I believe that the introduction of this system of paving is the most progressive movement that has taken place in our City since the installation of Water Works and Sewerage, and I think I can safely claim the credit of having introduced the system here.

With the present serious unemployment conditions prevailing I believe it is our duty as a City to provide work, where possible, for our laboring men and if you honor me by election, I will use my best efforts to have the work of paving continued.

Our City never was, nor never will be a large manufacturing centre, and while I am in favor of offering every inducement possible to manufacturer, to locate here, I believe we should cater more to the tourist trade, and the making of our City attractive by the building of good streets, is one of the best inducements we can offer them.

What we need in Charlottetown is more civic pride from both the individual and civic standpoint. Nature has done her part for us with a lavish hand, our shores are laved by the waters of three beautiful rivers emptying into a spacious land locked harbor while within our civic jurisdiction we have one of the most magnificent parks in the world. Our forefathers with a vision that was prophetic laid out our limits with wide streets and open squares which to-day evoke the admiration of the visitor, it is therefore now for us to do our part, and if elected to the office of Chief Magistrate it shall be my object and aim to make this Capital City a larger, better and more beautiful Charlottetown.

In addition to my position as Chairman of the Street Committee I have also been a member of the Light Committee, and when the new contract was being arranged with the Electric Light Company, I was instrumental in having a clause inserted, which when put into effect will, I believe very much improve our street lighting.

I am strongly in favor of Meat and Milk inspection, and while I do not claim the credit for having introduced this measure, I do claim that it had my unqualified support, and if elected I will endeavour to have it extended and enlarged so as to more fully safeguard the public health. It is not my intention to make a house to house canvass, I believe every man and woman in our City is intelligent enough to judge for themselves as to whom they desire to see elected. My record for the past four years is before you, and if you decide that it is such as to entitle me to be elected Mayor, I will appreciate the honor most highly.

Scottish Woollen Manufacturers To Tour Canada

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—A delegation of seventeen manufacturers, representing the Scottish Woollen Trade Mark Association, arrived here today on the steamship Baltic to visit the woollen interests of the United States and Canada. The delegation, according to a statement issued by its secretary, F. H. Bisset, is here not to sell or to talk prices but to advance the interests of their protective trade marks an emblem secured from the British Government in 1918 to protect the traditional reputation of Scotch woollen from adulterated imitations.

Members of the party, according to Mr. Bisset, represent approximately one-half of the woollen business of Scotland. Their itineraries call for a visit to Washington on January 14-16. On January 22 and 23 they will be in Boston, and from there they will go to Montreal, Toronto and Hamilton and back to New York, by way of Buffalo, Cleveland and Chicago.

Official Canadian headquarters of the party will be established at the Windsor Hotel, Montreal.

To the Electors of the City of Charlottetown

Ladies and Gentlemen:

Agreeable to the request of electors representing every Ward in the City, I shall take the honor of the office of Mayor at the Civic Election to be held on February 8th, and take this opportunity of soliciting your influence and support on that occasion.

Having been closely identified with the financial affairs of the city—as auditor—for many years, and, after a service of EIGHT consecutive years at the Council Board as Councillor for Ward Five,—during which time I served two years as Chairman of the Police Committee and six years as chairman of the Tender and Property Committee, was also a member of the Market Committee for two years, Light Committee for our years and for four years was assistant on the Finance Committee respectfully submit that my civic training should greatly assist me in the administration of the office which I now seek at your hands.

Owing to the hearty co-operation of the various Councils, the City has undergone a wonderful change during the last eight years. While it is true the financial burdens have somewhat increased, yet, the work completed has been of a thoroughly permanent nature, and employment has given at a time when most needed.

For the next two years—at least—our finances will not permit of programs entailing large expenditures; yet, there is much work to be done in linking up our principal streets, and rebuilding with gravel on extension and side streets which have necessarily been somewhat neglected during the last few years owing to lack of proper material.

There is also a great necessity for more concrete sidewalks, and they should be put down, as early as conditions will permit.

Our Firemen are entitled to greater consideration. If we cannot afford to pay them, the city should at least provide them with a reliable Fire Alarm System, which, I am told need not be expensive—yet efficient.

Gravel for our extension and side streets: The time has arrived when a co-operative effort should be made to re-open the City Graveyard at Surrey, where hundreds of thousands of tons of the choicest grades of gravel are to be had. The Railway is searching for gravel for ballast; the Provincial Government is importing such material from Nova Scotia, and the City had been doing the same. Why not get together, and as a result use our own material and give employment to our own people? Our laboring men deserve this at our hands, for were it not for the honest work performed for the wage paid we would not be in a position to boast of having constructed our Permanent works so cheaply.

Our Electric Lighting will be readjusted this year according to a contract already entered into by the Council, and a much better service may be expected.

A different system of Civic Assessment must be put in force in order to get more equitable valuations.

No PLACE IN CANADA affords greater attractions for the Tourist and Health seeker than Prince Edward Island, and his headquarters should be Charlottetown. We must unite in getting that trade.

Let our policy be progression within our means, and it is because I feel that I can be of greater service in forwarding the interests of Charlottetown that I respectfully ask you to elect me as Mayor.

The Ballot Act presumes that no Candidate shall make a personal canvass. To do so destroys the secrecy of the ballot which should be with the voter and his conscience. I have always respected the intention of the Law, and intend doing so in the coming election. Consequently, if elected, I shall feel that you have of your own free will so honored me that I shall be in duty bound to render you in return the very best service within my power.
