Despite Poor Tracks Russian Trains Give Efficient Service

MOSCOW, Nov. 7.—In the midst of the general industrial prostration, social disintegration, and the breakdown of many of the normal processes of life in Russia, nothing seems so striking as the efficiency and comfort of the railroad service. All though the Soviet has far from an adequate number of locomotives or passenger coaches, it maintains a travel service which, in much below the standard of imperial days, is at the same time a credit to the country with its present depleted resources.

no dining cars on these trains, passengers may secure wholesome food at the station restaurants along the route. There are no regular sleeping-cars, as in pre-war days, but comfortable berths and compartments of the local Russian type, equipped with clean bed linen, usually can be secured. First-class fares are considerably less than in the United States.

The railroads in Russia are run at a great deficit. The repair of the badly-worn rollingstock, the renewal of parts, the building of new passenger and freight cars, the strengthening and repair of insecure bridges, and the reconstruction of ruined water-towers and round-houses, have entailed enormous expense. The Soviet authorities are trying to secure a loan abroad for the Russian railroads, but the terms have not been sufficiently liberal to attract foreign capital.

Presentation To Mr. W. B. Robertson

Last Friday evening Mr. W. B. Robertson, retiring Collector of H. M. Customs and Excise in Charlottetown, was waited upon by his office by the staff of these Departments and presented with an address. It was read by Mr. Michael J. Moran, Chief Clerk, on behalf of the staff. The address was accompanied with a splendid brown leather travelling bag with Mr. Robertson's initials beautifully inscribed in gold letters.

The old order changeth, giving place to the new. How applicable is the adage to the Customs and Excise staff at Charlottetown; as one by one the older members, taking advantage of recent retirement legislation, transfer their official burdens to other shoulders. Today, it is you, Mr. Collector, who relinquishes the cares of office to enter into the enjoyment of well-earned retirement—and before you take official leave of us we desire to voice our appreciation of your many excellent qualities of head and heart.

As our chief-of-staff you have been all that could be desired. In an interesting companion and a faithful friend—one who, when official problems perplexed us, was always willing to lead, encourage, and assist. Considerate and indulgent, you have never essayed the role of a taskmaster, and in this, as well as many other respects you leave to your successor in office an example worthy of emulation.

We sincerely hope that the period of your retirement may extend over very many years, and that both Mrs. Robertson and yourself may continue to enjoy the blessing of health and happiness. We ask you to accept the accompanying gift as a small token of our esteem and regard, and trust it may frequently bring to your mind pleasant recollections of your years of association with the donors.

Your associates in the Department of Customs and Excise, Charlottetown, P. E. Island. Mr. Robertson had no idea whatever of the presentation but naturally felt very grateful to the staff. He expressed his gratitude in fitting words, referring to the kindness and amicable relations that had always existed between the staff and himself, and stating his appreciation of their efficiency and their courtesy. He assured them that he would always be conscious of the satisfactory and happy years they have spent together.

Mr. Robertson, comes from Marshfield, where the Robertson family, including many members, have been amongst the most prominent farming residents, not only of that community, but of the province at large. Some fifty years ago he came to the Capital of Prince Edward Island, and here he has lived during that long period. In 1872 he came to Charlottetown, and began his mercantile career with his brother, the late lamented Mr. Charles E. Robertson. Shortly afterwards he entered the Merchant's Bank of Prince Edward Island as a Clerk where he remained until 1878. Then Mr. Robertson decided to engage in business for himself, and from that time until 1896 he carried on an extensive import and seed business in this city, travelling all over the province in his business interests. Thus he became intimately acquainted with our people from North Cape to East Point and his business expanded as the years rolled by. In 1896 he was appointed by the Hon. Free Peter's Government as High Sheriff for Queen's County and in 1902, six years later, on the retirement of the late Mr. James Currie, Mr. Robertson was appointed Collector of Customs at this port—subsequently including the Excise.

Russia Has Freed Helpless Armenia From Fear of Turk

ERIVAN, Armenia, Nov. 7.—Armenia, which three years ago was starving and destitute, is now on its feet. If the Bolshevik regime, under which the country at present exists, has not given Armenia all the political advantages and freedom its people sought, it has at least brought peace and security to the desolate little state in the northern reaches of Asia. The Armenian no longer fears the Turkish invaders, who for hundreds of years made him a prey to their racial hatred and religious fanaticism. Where the European armies failed to keep Turkey at bay, the Red army of the Bolsheviks has held it in repression and has given the Armenian people a chance to live their own lives unmolested by warlike neighbors.
