Open to eligible Trotters and Pacers owned in New Brunswick Nova Scotia and P. E. Island, previous to the 1st day of January, 1909

TWO-YEAR-CLDSTAKE \$100.00
THREE-YEAR-OLD AND UNDERSTAKE \$100.00
THREE MINUTE CLASS \$100.00

The fees in each stake will be \$10.00, payable as follows: \$2.00 May 10th, \$2.00 June 10th, \$2.00 July 10th and \$2.00 August 10th when nominations close and the animal nominated must be named and the breeding, &c., given; \$2.00 on Sept. 10th. Five entries required; race to terminate at 5th heat.

In each stake the money will be divided as follows: When there are four or more starters 50 percent to first, 25 to second, 15 to third and in the event of only two starters, 60 percent to first and 40 to second. Any animal distancing the field or any part thereof, in any stake, will be entitled to first money only. In such an event those remaining to start on same terms as above and the balance of purse to be divided same percentage as above according to number of starters.

The two-year-old race, will be the last through five half mile heats.
DISTANCE—Three year old race one and a half miles, 150 year old race two hundred yards.
If race should not materialize, money to be refunded, less a small percentage for advertising &c.



—The latest news, first of all.

—Rev. Jas. McDougall will preach on Sabbath the 13th, at Summerside at 11 and 7.

—Creel McArthur, of the firm of Brace McKay and Co., Ltd., Summerside has gone on a business trip to New York.

—W. S. Newsom, Summerside, crosses today from Charlottetown to Pictou with six horses to the Nova Scotia market, and not New Brunswick as stated yesterday.

—Edward Monkley, of Brace, McKay and Co., Ltd., has presented the Presbyterian Church at Lot 14 with a valuable table cover and set of collection plates as an Easter offering.

—The Guardian omitted to say yesterday that arrangements have been completed for dredging Summerside harbor. A typographical error changed the sense of the local reference in Wednesday's issue.

—The schooner Malabar, Captain Kelly, has been loaded with potatoes and oats by Joseph Read and Co., Summerside, and expects to sail today for Point du Chene. Messrs. Read and Co. are also loading the schooner Telephone, which will sail for Pictou as soon as she is loaded.

—The funeral of the late Robert Hunter, teacher, Seaview, took place Wednesday to the Malpeque Cemetery. The services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Rattée of Malpeque and Rev. Mr. Nichols of Kensington. The deceased leaves a widow, nee Miss Adams, of Seaview, and one child to mourn.

—W. G. Schurman, agent for the Quebec Steamship Co., Summerside, has received word that the S. S. Campana will sail from Montreal for Summerside and Charlottetown on Monday April 26, ice permitting. This will make her due in Summerside on her first trip about the first of May.

—Before Stipendiary Wright as Summerside yesterday the case of Arthur Carr against James Arsenault in which the latter was charged with cruelty to animals was up for hearing and postponed until Monday next. The case arose over the beating by the defendant of a cow belonging to Carr which strayed on to the defendant's property.

—The strong north easterly wind of Wednesday night last resulted in the breaking of the ice bridge at the mouth of Summerside harbor and the harbor ice all went out yesterday morning, and the harbor is clear of ice except up the rivers and around the wharves which is rapidly breaking up, and the citizens of Summerside are now eagerly looking for the arrival of the good ship Empress.

—Yesterday afternoon, the tug, Alert and Weatherspoon, belonging to contractor McDonald of the Breakwater, Summerside, were engaged in cutting up the ice around the wharves, and the tooting of the whistles was a welcome sound to the citizens of Summerside. Would it not be advisable now that the winter steamers are still having trouble with the ice "on the old reliable route," to have the mails ordered to Tormentine and have one of Mr. McDonald's tugs, engaged to bring them to Summerside?

Mr. Andrew's lease for the present building does not expire for some time yet and he expects to have his new building ready before this lease expires.
