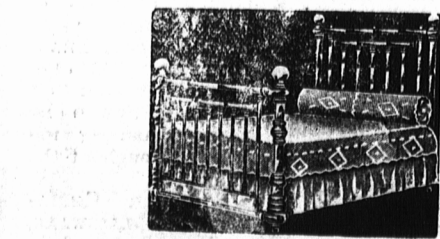

IRISH REPRESENTATION.

While we have no sympathy with the obstructive tactics of Mr. Redmond, the Irish leader, we must confess to a feeling of regret that the representation of Ireland in the imperial Parliament seems likely to be greatly diminished. We regret this because it will give to the Irish people a new grievance, which, whether real or imaginary must serve to increase the discontent in that Kingdom. We regret it because we doubt whether the gain from equalizing the proportion of representation to population will equal the loss from extinguishing what many of the people of Ireland regard as a treaty right. The case of Ireland is in this matter of representation closely parallel to that of Prince Edward Island. It is in one respect ever stronger than our own. Ireland was at the union given a certain representation. There was no thought among the Irish people that this number would ever be diminished. There was nothing in the terms of union as there is in our constitutional act providing for representation in proportion to population.

It is true that the representation of Ireland has been already reduced from the original number of 120 to 103 members in the House of Commons. This has been effected by degrees, and it forms a precedent. In our own case our representation in the Ottawa House was first reduced from six to five members without causing anything like the alarm and regret which was experienced under the more recent reduction from five to four. We see now only too clearly whether this is tending and how our importance and influence as a Province has been diminished. It is thus with Ireland and the case is the harder because Ireland has no local Parliament as we have. All her legislative business must be transacted across the Irish Channel in a Parliament in which her representation is being so greatly reduced. It would seem that the adoption of the federal system in the United Kingdom, with local Parliaments, even of very limited powers for each of the three Kingdoms, might give better satisfaction all around than the present legislative union.

The Maritime Merchant publishes a portrait of Rev. A. E. Burke coupled with an eulogistic notice and the announcement that he is expected to address the Maritime Board of Trade at its coming session in Yarmouth on the Tunnel question. Our Island people are much indebted to the Maritime Merchant for its zealous and able advocacy of better steamer service between the Island and the Mainland and its strong and convincing presentation of our right to the Tunnel.

CLOSE OF THE S. S. OF SCIENCE

After a Most Successful Session—Many Things Combined Towards That End—Review of the Work.

(Special Correspondence Guardian)

YARMOUTH July 29.—(Special).—On Friday last there was closed at Yarmouth N. S. the nineteenth session of the Summer School of Science for the Atlantic Provinces of Canada. This session was one of the most successful yet held by that organization.

Several things combined to make this school so successful. The enthusiastic support given to the school by the people of Yarmouth, the delightful weather experienced during the whole session, the earnestness with which the student body engaged in their work—the energy and ability of the instructors—these combined to justify the expression repeatedly made, "The best school yet held." All the classes were well filled and prosecuted their work with vigor. Amongst the most enthusiastic were the Botany, Drawing and Literature. The Botany class led by Messrs Hay, Vroom and Allen spent most of its time in the field. One hour's lecture each day in the classroom, the rest of the day was spent in field, swamp or by the sea-side collecting specimens and studying plants in their natural surroundings. One of the most interesting parts of this study was the consideration of plants in relation to their environment.

The Drawing class as conducted by F. G. Matthews was exceedingly interesting. He so arranged his work as to give to teachers of all the grades of the public schools, from the Kindergarten to the High School, just such work as they needed for their school work. In addition to the Drawing, Mr. Matthews gave a course in Card Board work. So practical was this work deemed to be by some of the teachers attending the school that they devoted their entire time to this one subject. Their testimony was that they were more than repaid the time and expense by the knowledge they had acquired. Knowledge that they could turn to practical account in the school-room.

The overflow class was the English Literature class, taught by Miss Robinson. In this class the works studied were Shakespeare's Coriolanus, and Scott's Old Mortality. This was not a study in parsing and analysis, but one in which the beauty and appropriateness of the language used by the author—the portrayal of character found in the work—the laws of criticism to be employed in judging a literary work. These were the lines pursued in this study and very interesting and helpful they were found to be. Through some means a report was circulated that it was intended to take literature from the course. The directors were at once waited upon by the school to protest against any such action. When assured that no such intention had ever been thought of by the directors such satisfaction was expressed.

Space forbids extended reference to the remaining subjects taught. All were interesting and profitably taught. It is proposed to add to the course for next year Amateur Photography and conversational French. These subjects are added in response to numerous requests made by members of the school. In fact a volunteer class was organized this year in Photography and was found to be very useful.

The evening meetings were very interesting. The subjects discussed were practical ones for teachers and bore directly upon the work of the school. Among those discussed were "Nature Study from the Commercial Standpoint," "Work for teachers and pupils during the holidays," "Geology and Geography as factors in the Industrial Development of Nova Scotia." The evening meetings partook of the nature of "A Round Table Talk" in which many members of the school partook. The evening, when Dr. Drummond, the author of "The Habitant" and other poems was present, and read selections from his own works was one that will be long remembered by the members of the school. For nearly two hours in his own inimitable manner he portrayed, by reciting his own beautiful poems, the peculiar and interesting characteristics of the French Acadian. It was a rare treat to hear the doctor.

The opportunities offered by the school to teachers and others, for self-improvement are becoming better known and appreciated year by year. Real live, up-to-date teachers seek to improve all the time. Such teachers are found attending the Summer School. It is pleasing to note that the numbers of such are increasing as manifested by the increased numbers attending the school.

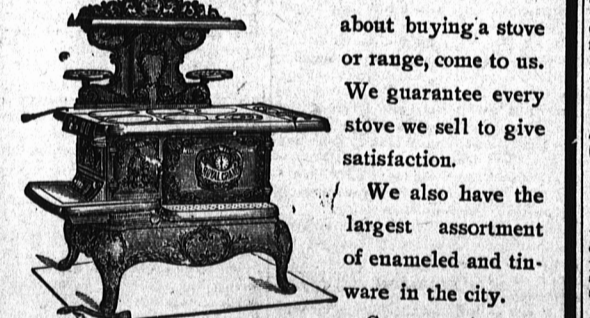
