Krupp is Not Dead

PARIS, March 21.—The Excelsior prints a strange story to the effect that Frederick Albert Krupp, head of the great Krupp family, who was supposed to have died in 1902, was lying under an assumed name in America, excited by the Kaiser. The story has been circulating for some time.

It relates that the Crown Prince, Herr Krupp, Count Eulenburg and an under-lieutenant, on the occasion of the Crown Prince's first public appearance and at the Crown Prince's request went to a cheap gambling house in Dusseldorf. The house was raided by the police and word of the escapade reached the imperial ears.

The Kaiser, who has long cherished the dream of being master of the great steel works at Essen, and who had found it impossible to bend the old head of them to his will, saw the story go in the incident a chance to work his will. Herr Krupp went to Capri. Then the news of his death was circulated. His coffin was brought back from Italy; the Kaiser delivered a funeral oration at his grave.

But the choice given to Herr Krupp had been death or banishment. He had chosen the latter, and his death service was merely to cover up the Kaiser's tracks.

It is pointed out in support of the feasibility of the story that it was in 1902, immediately after Herr Krupp's supposed death, that Germany began active preparation for the great struggle which is now precipitated.

CAY PIPES ARE CAUSE OF CANCER

NEW YORK, March 20.—James F. Ewing of the faculty of Cornell University medical school in a lecture on

"The Prevention of Cancer" under auspices of the New York Philanthropy in the United States Building urged people to consult physicians immediately if they had any reason to suspect that they had incipient cancer. He said he was sorry to say many doctors didn't always know a cancer when they saw one and advised sufferers to keep on consulting until they were satisfied finally with the diagnosis.

Mr. Ewing defined cancer as "lawless growth of tissue cells," and said authorities are satisfied it is not an infectious disease. He believed the parasitic factor in the causation of cancer can be ignored and added he didn't consider the question of heredity of much importance. He said cancer doesn't develop from normal cells, but is misplaced cells, are lost on the way during their period of formation. Irritation, he said, is another cause of cancer. Mr. Ewing

declared that external cancer of the skin develops from pigmented moles, especially the hairy kind. "If the mole is quiescent, let it alone," he said, "but if it shows a disposition to grow and become black have it cut out. Such a mole should be excised only by a competent surgeon. Any pigmented spot on the foot, especially on the sole or toes, should be cut out at once."

Mr. Ewing said that cancer of the mouth and tongue are often due to bad teeth and the use of tobacco. The sharp edges of teeth, he explained, are a source of irritation caused by a pipe particularly a clay pipe, always held in the same corner of the mouth he said, sometimes is responsible for cancer.

The pathologist said that 33.1 per cent. of all cancers are cancers of the stomach and explained that persistent indigestion without known cause is one of the symptoms that should

cause a sufferer to consult a physician without delay. He suggested that every woman over 35 should have her breast examined by a physician every six months in order to determine whether she is at all likely to be suffering from incipient cancer. The moment he said, an early application should be made to a doctor or a clinic for a diagnosis.

He declared that much suffering could be prevented and many lives saved by early treatment and operations.
