Shirley Temple At Prince Edward

There's so much to laugh at, so much to love, so many things to take away and remember in Shirley Temple's new picture, "Just Around The Corner," which opened yesterday at the Prince Edward Theatre, that even the most glowing comment can hardly do justice either to Shirley or to the delightful show which 20th Century-Fox has fashioned around its Number One star.

You'll simply have to go see it for yourself!

For "Just Around The Corner" is not only the best picture Shirley Temple has ever appeared in, but also one of the most entertaining hits ever produced by the studio that has given us so many great pictures in the past. And it finds Shirley in her happiest role, one which allows her an occasional outbreak of that mischievous humor which is said to be so characteristic of her irrepressible spirit outside the studio.

The picture opens with Shirley returning home from boarding school to find her architect Dad down on his luck. Having invested all his money in a great slum clearance project, work on which has been suspended for lack of additional capital, Farrell has given up his penthouse and taken a basement room in the same apartment building. Once the biggest paying tenant in the building, he is now one of its humblest employees.

The reason, he explains to Shirley, is because of what is happening to Uncle Sam. Uncle Sam could fix everything—if only people would help him.

Shirley naturally assumes that her Dad is referring to the fabulously wealthy Samuel Henshaw—who is "Uncle Sam" to her, payable, Bennie Barrett, and to the lovely Amanda. So she conspired with Bert Laehr, Joan Davis and Bill Robinson to put on a big benefit show in the basement of the apartment house—and "Uncle Sam" (Henshaw) is to be the beneficiary!

The newspapers get wind of Shirley's show, which is a tremendous success, and what follows provides a thrilling and completely satisfactory climax for everyone concerned.

Western And Serial At Captol

Adventure and red-blooded action are contained in "Call of the Rockies," Columbia drama at the Capitol Theatre. When the old west was young, hard-riding, straight-shooting cowboys battled it out with gun-toting rustlers and bandits and the latest Charles Starrett starring film rekindles the excitement and spirit of those pioneer days.

Fundamentals of Linebreeding

Group 5 (1) Clear Silver v. Muddy Silver.

Off-coloured and muddy silver is prevalent to an alarming extent. While muddiness and clearness of silver are dependent to some extent on diet, yet on the other hand evidence clearly indicates that in some lines of foxes the silver is liable to go off colour or acquire a muddy appearance. Every fox breeder should classify the foxes in his ranch into different groups, clear silver, muddy silver and groups intermediate between the two extremes. Only by classifying the foxes can the undesirable types of silver be eliminated from the breeding stock.

Random mating of different types has led to off-coloured silvers which can be remedied by judicious linebreeding.

Many of the full silver foxes lack character and have a bald appearance on account of the fact that the silver has a very short black tip. The length of the black tip is an important factor in the selection of the breeding stock.

There has been an entire lack of judgment in selection with respect to the silver bar. A few years ago the ranches were overrun with narrow silver bars. The Dominion Experimental Fox Ranch took the initial step in making definite recommendations that these should be eliminated from the breeding stock and it is still advisable that foxes showing a silver bar of 1-4 inch or under should be eliminated. 3-8 to 3-4 inch bars give a very desirable character to the fur, but over and above that width the value of a silver bar is not proportional to the width of the bar.

A large number of silver foxes are appearing with black tipped silver hairs. Black tipped silver hairs refer only to those hairs where the silver extends from the black tip to the surface of the body. Such hairs, when the fur is fine and the silver has a chalky appearance, are a menace rather than an asset from a breeding standpoint. It would be to the advantage of breeders who have such foxes to breed for a 1-4 inch bar rather than for a bar of greater width. The great majority of the full silver foxes have lost their character and beauty and begin to look more like a woolly sheep than a silver fox. On the other hand, it may be altogether a different question where a fox breeder has selected for strength and metallic silver. In that case silver hairs may have some economic value from a breeding standpoint, but it is questionable if they will ever be superior to 1-2 to 3-4 inch bars from a peit standpoint. The wide bar full silver furs that are being produced at the present time are not enhancing the reputation of silver fox ranching.

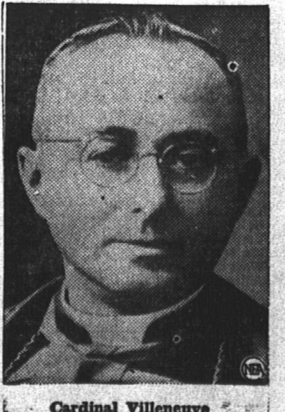

Cardinals May Elect Pope From These

Jean Marie Rodrigue Cardinal Villeneuve, Archbishop of Quebec, was born in Montreal, Nov. 2, 1858. He was ordained in the Ottawa basilica, May 25, 1907. From 1920 to 1930, he served as Superior of St. Joseph's Scholasticate at Ottawa, during which time he received many honorary degrees. Despite his absorbing occupation as an educational leader, he found time to further other Catholic work in Canada, to write many articles and deliver many lectures. In 1930, new diocese was created in southern Saskatchewan and Father Villeneuve was installed as Bishop of Gravelbourg. In 1932, he took possession of the metropolitan see of Quebec. Upon his return to Quebec in 1933, after he had received the red hat of the cardinal in Rome, a crowd of more than 40,000 people turned out to welcome him home.

Regarded as one of the greatest preachers in Italy today, Carlo Cardinal Salotti was born July 25, 1876, and ordained Sept. 25, 1894, in his diocese of Montefiascone. When he had finished his higher ecclesiastical studies in Rome, he was appointed professor of philosophy in the Pontificio Seminario Romano, holding this chair for 11 years. Later he was appointed promoter of the Faith and in 1930 was elevated to serve as secretary of the Congregation of Propaganda. In the Consistory of December, 1935, the Pope announced the elevation of Monsignor Salotti to the purple. In 1936, Italy accorded him the decoration of Commander of the Colonial Order of the Star of Italy. He is the author of many works and has been particularly interested in the development of canonization and beatification.



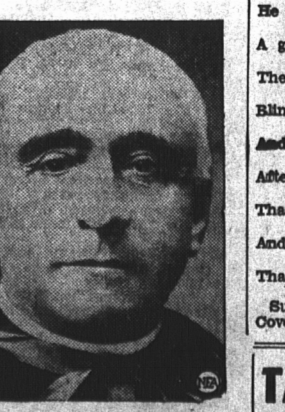

A record of service in Rome under four Popes is possessed by Frederico Cardinal Tedeschini, born Oct. 15, 1872. Ordained in 1890, he was called to the Vatican in 1900 upon completion of his studies in the Seminario Pio. There he served under Pope Leo XIII as Assistant of the Secretariat of State. In 1907, Pope Pius X named him Chancellor of Apostolic Briefs, in which position he served until appointed Subsecretary of State by Pope Benedict XV. Here he established a special office of news for seeking out of founded soldiers or prisoners in warring countries. For 14 years following 1921, Tedeschini was Papal Nuncio at Madrid, being made a Cardinal in 1936. His influence was largely instrumental in the building of the church through the early part of the Spanish revolution.

Virtually every office in the Sacred Congregation of Rites has been held by Alessandro Cardinal Verde, born March 27, 1875. Ordained in 1898, he studied with distinction at the Pontificio Seminario Pio in Rome and gained a position as professor of law in the Seminario Romano. In 1894, he entered the Sacred Congregation of Rites where he was named Promoter of the Faith and Consistorial Advocate three years later. He became Secretary of the Congregation in 1915, holding this office for 10 years. At the end of the Holy Year, in the Consistory of December, 1925, Pope Pius XI crowned the activities of Monsignor Verde by creating him a Cardinal of the Order of Desceans. In the Consistory of December, 1935, Cardinal Verde passed into the Order of Cardinal Bishops.
