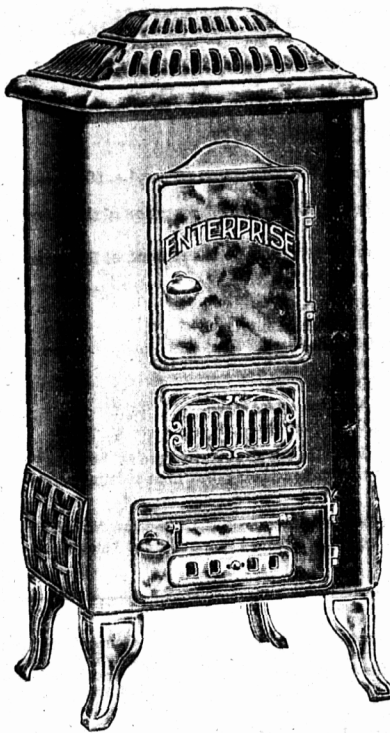

IN MEMORIAM

The following is taken from the Dec. 15th issue of the Mountaineer, published at Rocky Mountain House, Alberta.
 The late John A. Birt was a native of Cardigan, P. E. Island.
 The remains arrived in Charlottetown Monday, Dec. 27, and were forwarded to Cardigan for interment.
UNEXPECTED DEATH
OF JOHN A. BIRT
 Word was circulated on Saturday evening of the death of one of our oldest and most respected citizens, in the person of John A. Birt, who died at 10 p. m. on Saturday, December 11, 1926, at the age of forty-six years.
 To say it was a shock to the community in putting it very mildly. Most of us knew that Jack was down with a touch of neuritis, but never for a moment entertained any idea of its terminating fatally. The day of his death was down town, a little shakier perhaps but still able to impart his usual dry humor.
 From the first day of his illness, he resisted the suggestion of going to hospital and it wasn't until Saturday evening when the neuritis began to interfere with the heart action, that he was taken to the local hospital. Everything possible was done for his comfort and relief, but he died within an hour.
 To say the least the deceased will be sadly missed in this community. He came here in 1910 from Maine, and has followed his trade as barber practically ever since that time. Good-natured, jovial and generous, he was always ready to help the needy, and there are many who will remember with sad kindness the favor, or help, they received from his hands—a splendid citizen.
 He was a high officer in the I. O. O. F. and the L. O. L. and also a Mason.
