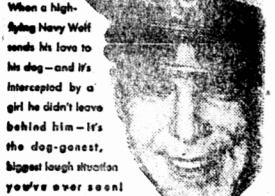

SON IS LIBERATED - Mrs. M. F. Riley, Belle River, has received official word that her son, Ptl. Lt. John M. Riley has been liberated from a German prison camp and is now in the United Kingdom. Ptl. Lt. Riley has been a prisoner for over two years.

RETURNED TO ENGLAND - Thirty-two Canadian prisoners of war since early March have been driving over bomb-blasted German roads to bring food to their buddies in prison camps, are now back in England. They are the men who volunteered to drive for the International Red Cross, to bring medical supplies and food parcels to camps no longer accessible by rail. Among them is Pte. Louis Francis Trainor, whose mother, Letitia Trainor, lives at 265 Dorchester Street, Charlottetown.

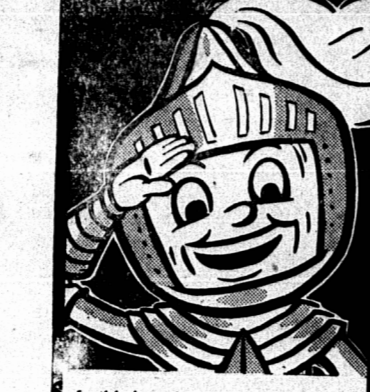
