France May Make Physical Training Department of Government

The development of sport and athletics may shortly be taken under the direct supervision of the French Government, the idea being that physical training of the rising generation is quite as important to the nation as art or railways, and that it is in accord with the new spirit of progress in France.

The French Cabinet has under consideration the question of asking Parliament to create an Under Secretary of State, who shall be attached to the Ministry of Labor, and whose duties will be solely to look after sporting affairs.

DANGER IN WATER CHEMICALLY PURE

Continued Use of it May Lead to Tuberculosis—Mineral Salts a Necessary Ingredient

Word comes of investigations carried on by a number of French naval surgeons into the use of chemically pure water as a drink. To make water chemically pure it has to be distilled, and the continued use of distilled water as a beverage reduces the strength of the physical organism, because, while it is free from all germs, it contains nothing but oxygen and hydrogen. The mineral salts are left behind during the process of distillation, and the mineral salts are really indispensable.

"As long as life persists in the body," these surgeons declare, "the elimination of mineral salts goes on, and this means the rapid demineralization of the organism."

Demineralization, it is explained, leaves one's system in such a state that the natural tendency is to become tubercular. It was found that there were numerous cases of tuberculosis among the young sailors of the French navy, and this was, after long investigation, attributed to the demineralization of the water.

The distilled water was used in the belief that it was best for the sailors, and the naval authorities were anxious to make every condition as healthy as possible. Just now the surgeons are studying the best means of treating the distilled water used aboard the ships with mineral matter. Of course, pure water is wanted, but as conditions are now it is held that ordinary drinking water would be even better than the chemically pure, if the latter was responsible for the increase of tuberculosis in the navy. Few people continually drink chemically pure water, and for this reason the dangers could not well be learned until this discovery was made. There are a number of ways in which the germs in water may be eliminated and at the same time the mineral salts left in the fluid. Distilled water is scarcely palatable at the best, as it is these very necessary mineral salts that make it really palatable.

An effort is being made to provide further proof of the dangers of chemically pure water as maintained by the surgeons of the French navy by means of experiments on animals.

The Elephant and His Driver

Those in a position to speak authoritatively on the subject assure us that, as a worker, the elephant never volunteers his services, though he can be trained to perform all manner of work. He will, however, proceed to any task unless he be so ordered by his driver mahout, to whose guidance he submits for the simple reason that he is aware that disobedience brings punishment.

Sitting on the elephant's neck, the mahout governs the big beast by an iron hook and spike, which resembles a bathhook and weighs from four to six pounds. The mahout drives the elephant forward by digging the point of the spike into its head, and pulling him back by inserting the hook into the tender base of the ears.

An elephant whose mahout rules him responds readily to the secret signs of his driver. The pressure of the mahout's toe, the compression of his knee, the tap of his heel, or the slightest swaying of his body to one side, all constitute a driving system whereby the powerful beast is guided in very much the same way in which a ship responds to the rudder.

Uses of Potash

Potash is extensively used in the United States in gold mining, glass-making, bluing, photography, dyeing, explosives and fertilizers, and most of the supply comes from Germany.
