Lecture Last Evening on The Passion Play

Rev. M. J. Smith delivered his lec-
ture "The Passion Play" in St. Dun-
stan's Parish Hall last evening before
a large and very appreciative audi-
ence. Although this lecture was given
here eight years ago the interest in
the subject is still very much alive as
was demonstrated by the large num-
ber of critics present who had heard
it on the first occasion.

Father Smith began his lecture by
tracing the origin and history of the
Passion Play. Its first presen-
tation was given in 1634
as the outcome of a vow
taken by the villagers of Oberammer-
gau, in Bavaria. A plague had swept
through that country carrying off
thousands of the people. The people
of Oberammergau made the
vow that they would present
in dramatic form the
mystery of the Passion every ten
years if the pestilence was stayed. Or
the immediate cessation of the plague
they immediately started to fulfil the
vow and its fulfilment has been faith-
fully carried out ever since by the
succeeding generations.

Rev. Dr. Smith was present at the
last presentation of the Passion Play
in 1910 and presented to his audience
75 splendid views of the different
scenes and personages of the drama.
Rev. Dr. J. C. McMillan presided
at the lecture in his very pleasing
manner and the orchestra of St. Dun-
stan's University discoursed appro-
priate selection before the speaker be-
gan his address.

During an interval Rev. Dr. Gillis
Cardigan, contributed a splendid vocal
solo in keeping with the sacred sub-
ject of the lecture, entitled, "Outside
the Heavenly Gates." Messrs James
P. Melnis and Samuel Doyle, also
contributed solos before the lecture.
During the crucifixion scene, Mr. J.
Austin Trainor sang with splendid
effect, "Calvary."

A vote of thanks was moved by Mr.
Alex A. McDonald, seconded by Prof.
J. H. Blanchard, which was fittingly
acknowledged by Rev. Dr. Smith.

The National Anthem brought the
proceedings to a close.

Splendid Lecture In Market Hall By Captain Best

Before an audience which filled the
spacious Market Hall, Captain Tom
Best last evening delivered a magnifi-
cent address on various matters in con-
nection with the war, more especially
the great war which has been carried
on by the Y. M. C. A. in all the theatres
of war.

The Captain is a "free and easy"
speaker who takes his hearers, right
into his confidence and holds their
attention from the start clear to the
finish.

He paid high tribute not only to the
boys who fought in the trenches but
to the lads of the navy and the me-
chant marine who had done their
part so nobly.

The great morale of the Canadian
troops was a point upon which he
laid special emphasis. This he believ-
ed was in large part due to their home-
training as well as their patriotic
spirit.

He referred to a number of organiza-
tions which had contributed no small
degree to this morale, notably the
chaplains service, the Red Cross and
the Y. M. C. A. The last named
organization had been working among
soldiers since 1871. Before the soldiers
got to Valcartier the Y. M. C. A. was
there. It was to be found in the cities
of Britain, France and Belgium, and
in the words of General Currie, it had
proved indispensable. He believed that
when the nation wide appeal is made
on behalf of this institution from May
5th to 9th for a sum to supplement
the work still being carried on, a great
response will be made. The speaker
made inspiring reference to the
battle of the Marne which he held
to be the turning point of the war—
a miracle—and concluded by reciting
feelingly the poem of his dead son,
Colonel John McRae—"In Flanders
Fields."

The National Anthem brought the
meeting to a close.

Bolsheviki Defeated By Lithuanians

(Special to The Guardian)
STOCKHOLM, April 7.—The fol-
lowing official statement has been is-
sued by the Lithuanian press bureau
at Kovno:

The Bolsheviki are evacuating the
whole of Northern Lithuania, after
a series of fights in which they have
suffered severe casualties. At sever-
al places Bolsheviki soldiers have mur-
dered. The Lithuanians have captur-
ed the towns of Ponevez and Kupijsk
after violent fighting. The Bolshe-
viki are retreating in disorder to-
ward Drinsk.
