War Secretary Stimson Cancels Heavyweight Bout Between Louis And Conn

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25-(AP)—The heavyweight championship fight between Joe Louis and Billy Conn, scheduled for Oct. 12, was cancelled today by War Secretary Henry Stimson on the grounds that it conflicts with the standards and interests of the army.

Ending the 24-hour investigation he began yesterday after announcing he was "shocked" over some details of the bout which was to be held in New York's Yankee Stadium, Stimson ordered Sgt. Louis and Cpl. Conn "returned at once to their military duties."

The proposed return match of one of the most spectacular heavyweight title tussles of recent years was wiped off the calendar with \$300,000 worth of tickets already sold or ordered and with a \$1,000,000 gain in prospect.

Stimson issued his order after a series of conferences with War Department men and officials of War Boxing, Inc., the organization set up to run the bout. He had conferred for several hours over various aspects of the arrangements, among them the plan to deduct \$135,451 from the gate to pay debts listed against Louis and Conn.

At the conclusion of the meetings, Stimson announced that the standard and interests of the army do not permit the proposed contest to be carried out.

There were numerous other minor matters settled at the meeting. The schedule was drawn up, providing a 30-game season for each of the league's six remaining clubs.

The members voted also to make official a sentiment expressed previously to discourage the employment in professional hockey of players who are of military age.

But the biggest news was the unanimous decision of the Governors to suspend the fight since the league was reduced to seven teams a few years ago has called for 48 games a club, 24 home and 24 away.

The season will open Oct. 31, with Rangers at Toronto and Boston at Montreal. The schedule will end March 18.

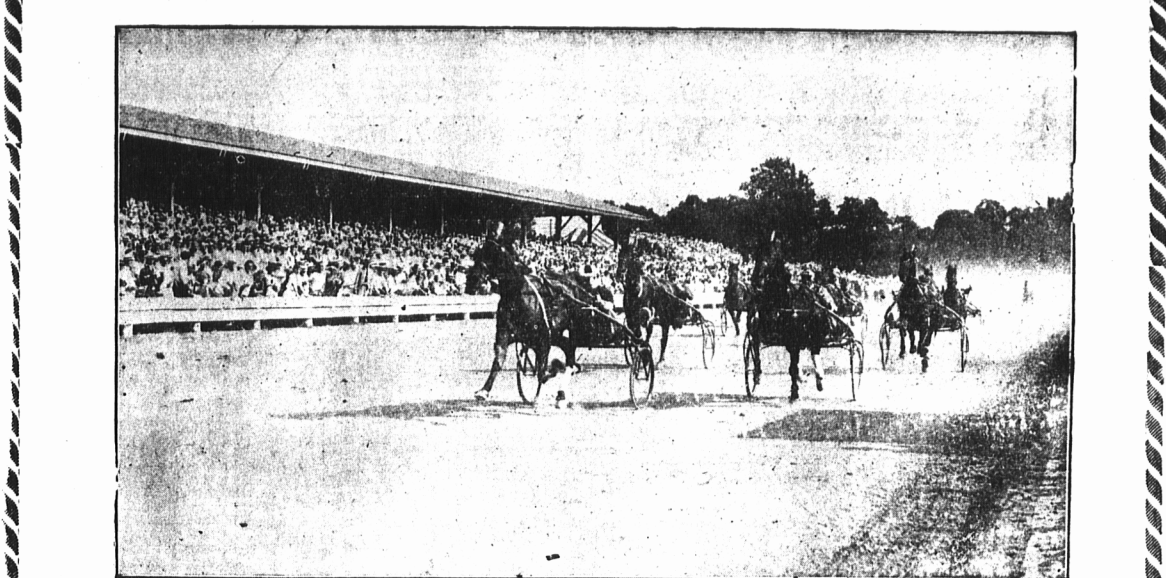
Those unpredictable Dodgers came clawing up out of the valley of the snow again today to win another extra-inning victory and carry the National League flag race right down to the wire.

Sisti, however, out loose a throw that was so high catcher Ernie Lombardi didn't even bother to jump for it, and the game was over as Doll Camilli raced over the plate.

Sisti also let in what proved the winning Brooklyn run yesterday by uncloaking a peg over Lombardi's head on which Camilli scored. It was a result of two towering home runs by Boston's Max West, the first of which drove in two men ahead of him, the second sent in to the last of the eighth inning today trailing by a run. A pinch single by Lew Riggs and a triple by Arky Vaughan enabled fortune's children to tie the score and struggle through to eventual victory.
