**McGraw Would Allow Pitchers to Dry Ball**

John McGraw, in a New York interview, gives the impression that he is not so much concerned as to whether the spitalbers get a reprieve or not, but he does think there should be a modification of the rules that would permit the pitchers to dry the ball, rather than let it, McGraw says:

"In my opinion, the cause of the tremendous hitting the past season is the rule which prevents the pitcher's former custom of putting rosin on his fingers in order to take the gloss off the ball. The strict enforcement of this rule has handicapped all of the pitchers. Personally, I do not believe the public cares for old-fashioned slugging matches and scores that run 'The splitter and the shiner can be abolished without hurting the game. 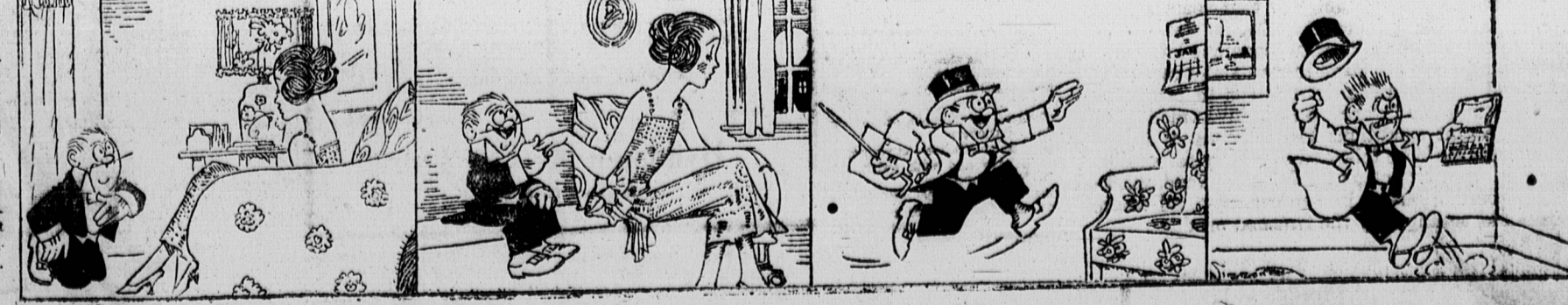
