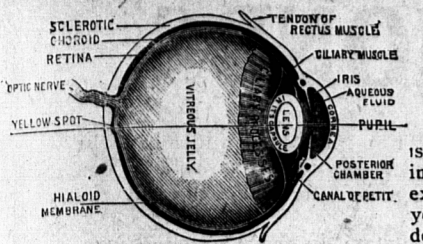

THE arrival at Gibraltar of the Second Cruiser Squadron under the command of Prince Louis of Battenberg, which recently visited American waters, calls the thin story that the real destination of these ships was the Baltic, where they were to be ready to carry off the Czar and his Court. It was found necessary to take such steps to preserve the Russian ruler.

THE Black Diamond line steamer Lou isburg, Capt. McPhail, is now on passage to St. John's, Nfld., with a full general cargo. The Louisburg left Montreal on Tuesday and was the second last vessel to come down the St. Lawrence this season, being followed only by the G. P. R. liner Lake Michigan. The steamer Bergenhus, of the Black Diamond line, also sailed from Montreal on Tuesday. During the season which has just closed the Bergenhus made twenty round trips from Sydney to Montreal in the Dominion Coal Company's trade, carrying a total of over 110,000 tons of coal, or over half the yearly output of Reserve mines ten years ago.
