The Guardian's attention has been drawn to the fact that in making a comparison of the civic election vote of 1906 and 1908 it omitted the state that in 1906 Ward Three was contested by G. T. Alley and Arthur J. B. Mellish, the former being elected to the Council by a majority of fifty votes.

J. C. Lithgow, president of the M. P.A.A.A., who has been in Moncton since Monday, has decided, on recommendation of the N.B.H.M. executive, to reinstate McDonald, Williams and Oran of the Capitals, and Cushing of Moncton, who were suspended a few days ago. The friends in this Province of Cushing and Williams will read the above with pleasure.

The annual meeting of the Stanley Bridge Dairymen's Co. was held last week. There was quite a large attendance of patrons and shareholders. The business of the cheese season amounted to \$16,711.33c. The receiving most money was John McEwen who got \$232.17 for 36,341 patrons got \$13,500 for milk or an average of \$100 each. The patron pounds of milk. It cost \$134.00 to draw 1,501,352 pounds of milk to the factory. The cheese maker got \$1247.54 for making and finding all supplies. The butter factory in connection was operated during the three months of November, December and January, and made about 110,000 lbs of milk into butter. The butter sold for 17c per pound and the patrons will realize about one dollar a hundred for milk. The directors elected at the annual meeting are:—Walter Simpson, W. H. Hogan, J. Herbert Simpson, W. Taylor, Murray Robertson, Alexander Buntain, Miller Fryling all officers so far as appointed are: Walter Simpson, president; Alexander Buntain, Vice-president; John C. Clark and J. A. Clark, auditors. This company does the second largest dairy business of any on the Island.

A mute missionary has been travelling through this Province from end to end and found quite a number of uneducated deaf and dumb children from six to fifteen years of age, who he thinks, should be sent to a school that will educate them. The Halifax Institution for the deaf and dumb is the only school that will admit the children from this Province, and receive the grant of one hundred and fifty dollars per head from the P.E.I. Government yearly. Deaf and dumb children are admitted free and must be provided with clothing and travelling expenses by parents. Dumb as well as deaf children who cannot get educated at any public school should be given a chance to go abroad and be educated at a school that will educate them. They should never be allowed to grow up uneducated and miss the chance of making their own way in the world, for many deaf mutes have been allowed to grow up uneducated as a result of their parents' selfishness, foolish affection, unwillingness to part with them, or ignorance of any school for the education of the deaf and dumb, and then turn to blame their parents for not sending them to school like their brothers and sisters and fitting them for their living in the world. The census of 1901 shows there are 98 deaf mutes on the Island. Not 35 of them had been educated. The parents' true love of their unfortunate children is to send them to be well educated like them. The Halifax Institution was established in 1837, the first school of this kind in Canada and rebuilt of brick and stone at the cost of fifty-five thousand dollars in 1895. It is a splendid modern boarding school and has a staff of four officers and ten assistant teachers all hearing except two. The pupils are instructed under the oral and hand system and taught the art manual training, sewing and dress-making and domestic science as fitting them for their living when they leave school. They have a Kindergarten class and pupils' library. The missionary has shown himself as well educated to the parents of deaf children he has found, and is himself deaf and dumb like their children who had almost thought they were each the only deaf and dumb child on earth. The proper age for getting educated is six years, and thinking them too young and waiting till they are ten or fifteen causes the loss of valuable time in education and makes it more difficult to instruct them. It is the proper way of sending them, to be educated and being proud of them for their success in their education and life. Parents do not understand the way of educating their children since they cannot hear or speak, nor find it easy to teach or make them understand what they are wanted to do except by means of natural signs.

The Cavendish Lazy Club enjoyably entertained the New Glasgow Literary Club last week. There was a good program, excellent refreshments and a jolly time spent by all.

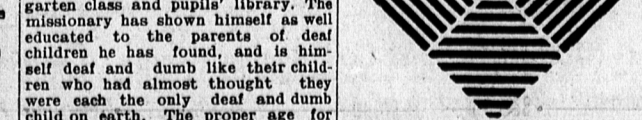
The death occurred at North Carleton on Feb. 7th of Caroline Ann McNeill widow of the late Gilbert McNeill at the advanced age of 79 years. She leaves to mourn four children, George in Colorado; Arthur in Massachusetts; Mrs. Donald Matheson, Wilmet and Manson at home.

There died at Grand View, on the 7th inst., John D. McLeod, the only surviving son of Mrs. Donald McLeod in the twenty-sixth year of his age. He graduated from Prince of Wales College when quite young, and taught school with marked success for some years. He had intended to study medicine but his health broke down. His numerous friends sympathize with his widowed mother and two sisters, who deeply feel their heavy bereavement.

The death occurred at Head of Hillsboro recently of James Rattray, after a lingering illness of eighteen months. He was sixty-six years of age. The funeral took place to West St. Peter's Cemetery and despite the almost impossible condition of the roads was largely attended. Services at the house and grave were conducted by Rev. Mr. Valentine. There are left to mourn a widow and eight children:—Henderson of St. Peter's; George, in New Hampshire; Mrs. Robinson, Lawrence, Mass; Mrs. Betty, Methuen, Mass; Mrs. Bellinger, Providence, R. I.; Albert in Saskatchewan, Ambrose and Bertha at home. Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved family.

Inspector McCormac recently received from Count Makino, Minister of Education for Japan an unique and interesting souvenir, being a fac simile of an Imperial Rescript on education issued by the Emperor and bearing the Imperial Seal and Imperial Sign Manual of the Mikado. This rescript was delivered to the Prime Minister and the Minister of Education as a uniform basis of moral teaching for the scheme of the Japanese Empire. With the Rescript Mr. McCormac received an English version of the same, and from it is copied the following paragraph, which all will admit is replete with good advice. "Ye, Our Subjects be filial to your parents, affectionate to your brothers and sisters, as husbands and wives be harmonious, as friends true; bear yourselves in modesty and moderation; extend your benevolence to all; pursue learning and cultivate arts and thereby develop intellectual faculties and perfect moral powers; furthermore advance public good and promote common interests, always respect the constitution and observe the laws, should emergency arise offer yourselves courageously to the State, and thus guard and maintain the prosperity of Our Imperial Throne coeval with heaven and earth. So shall ye not only be our good and faithful subjects, but render illustrious the best traditions of your forefathers."
