

Trinity Church W.M.S. Meeting

The Women's Missionary Society of Trinity United Church, Charlottetown, met in Hearts Memorial Hall on Thursday evening at 8 p.m. with the president, Mrs. R. E. Mutch presiding and fifty-six members present.

The meeting opened with prayer by the pastor, Rev. G. C. Carley, and the hymn "In Whom We Trust". Mrs. J. A. MacNeil read the scripture passages, followed by the prayer of the president, Mrs. Mutch.

The secretary, Mrs. E. Bustin, opened the business period by reading the minutes of the January meeting and Mrs. J. G. MacNeil gave the treasurer's report which was very gratifying.

While the offering was being received, the president announced that the World Day of Prayer service for Charlottetown would be held in the Central Christian Church on Friday, Feb. 21st, at 3 p.m. The offering was dedicated by the pastor, Rev. G. C. Carley.

Mrs. Mutch gave a very interesting talk on the different customs in India and afterwards gave a brief synopsis of the E. E. Wood Memorial held last week.

She spoke of the Wednesday afternoon meeting in Hearts Memorial Hall when all the wonderful reports were given by the different secretaries, followed by the beautiful Memorial and Communion service in the church at 4 p.m.

She told of the evening meeting in the church—how our president, Mrs. Miller, with her captivating manner, was listened to with rapt attention as she spoke on her theme "The Master and the Disciple".

Following is the text of the address read to the church:

TEXT OF ADDRESS

To Mr. John Cronin, Benefactor of the Benevolent Irish Society:

As a mountain climber passes from time to time to look back to the valley from which he started, and, heartily, returns to his arduous task of moving on and upward, so we members of the Benevolent Irish Society turn to the pages of the records of men who have served the Society long and generally, return to our task encouraged and determined to carry on by our senior members.

Your record, dear friend, is one of which we are proud. You were initiated into the Benevolent Irish Society in 1900—35 years ago. For 22 years you held such important offices as president, vice president, second vice president, secretary and treasurer.

For the past five years that you did not hold major offices, you were an active member of various committees. Who would not applaud such a life of service?

As grateful fellow members, we have come together this evening to present to you a life membership medal to the Benevolent Irish Society, the highest honor we can bestow, as an appreciation of 36 years of generous self-giving in the interests of the Society.

It has been a long way from our first headquarters on Dorchester Street to our present spacious and modern home in the heart of the city.

It is to you that we owe the growth of the Society, the increase of its membership, the high honor of being the largest of the Benevolent Irish Societies in the Dominion.

The tendency toward materialism and selfishness in our times are insensibly led to form an estimate of events by their influence upon this life alone. A true member of the Benevolent Irish Society, loyal to its faith and its heritage, realizes that the nation that serves God can never fail in its greatest.

Your example as a man of noble character and ideals, quietly giving of your best to follow you to live as loyal sons of the Father, is a shining example to all of us.

In presenting you with this Life Membership Medal, let us assure you on this happy occasion that we hope you will spend many more pleasing years in our midst, and with grateful hearts let us wish you in Saint Patrick's name, a real Irish "God bless you."
