POLICEMEN ARE CHARGED WITH STEALING

MONTREAL, Jan 8.—Following the arraignment yesterday of Claude Vachet, who, a few days ago, while a constable attached to the central police station, is alleged to have stolen a fur muff and cape from the establishment of Ascher Bros., St. Paul Street, Constable Louis Lecompte, of the East Craig street station, was taken into custody on a charge of having received stolen goods. Later in the day Foreman Alphi Raynor, of the Ontario street fire station, was taken into custody on a charge of theft.

The two policemen entered pleas of not guilty and were remanded until next Thursday. Unable to secure bail, they were taken to Bordeaux jail.

Fire Foreman Gaynor is charged with stealing a quantity of gloves and other articles during a fire in Ontario street early on Tuesday morning. The articles were accidentally left on a street car and later taken home by the police. At the station house they were recognized as corresponding to reported missing goods. The police placed them in charge of the tramway company and Gaynor was arrested when he called to claim them. He will be arraigned to-day.

He was present on one or two occasions at the People's Theatre when battleships or some other reminder of the Motherland was flashed on the screen. The moment the Union Jack came into view the orderly audience became a hurrying, whistling, thumping crowd, cheering to the echo the Emblem of their Empire. It thrilled, made one realize that that bit of hunting stood for more than a piece of colored cloth. It will no doubt be pleasant for the parents and for the representatives of the city to hear an outsiders impressions of its people.

NEW HEBRIDES MISSIONS AND THEIR HISTORY

(By Daniel Logan)

A published statement that the New Hebrides mission, which has just spread severely in the terrible earthquake on the island of Ambrim or Anetum, is an English institution may be misleading. That mission is not included in the operations of the London Missionary Society in the South Seas, although it has always had the sympathy of that organization, with at times practical assistance, particularly in the matter of transportation. It is mainly a "Bluenose" missionary enterprise, with some Australian co-operation as well as Scottish. Its pioneer was the Rev. John Geddie and its history up to the seventies is embodied in his life, a volume now before me written by Rev. James Patterson, D. D., the historian of my native county and one of my direct predecessors in its journalism, also a contributor to my newspaper in his advanced years.

As Geddie spent some time in Honolulu on his way out to his post of years ago, and during his mission corresponded with missionaries here, besides having made a career among the most illustrious in the history of Christian evangelism in heathendom, a short account of his life may be interesting to many readers of this paper. He was born in Banff, Scotland, in 1815, and was brought to Pictou, N. S., by his parents the following year, his father settling there as a clockmaker. And a good clockmaker he was, as 14 years ago I saw in the house of a brother a Geddie clock still telling time truly. If a digression may be permitted, I may say that Geddie went to his life's work from a region that, within a radius of about a hundred miles, in three provinces, produced such men as Simon Newcomb, America's greatest astronomer; President Schurman of Cornell university; several other presidents and professors of United States, Canadian and British colleges; Hon. Franklin Lane, secretary of the interior in President Wilson's cabinet; and, among men prominent in Hawaii, a supreme court justice—father of the present chief justice—the founder of the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Company, the present principal of the territorial normal school, the sitting president of the Hawaii Medical Society and other doctors, several sugar plantation managers, including the late James Renton and the late Daniel Foster, the first superintendent of the Honolulu marine railway and his son and successor, and several engineers of high standing.
