GENERAL ASSEMBLY AT HALIFAX

HALIFAX, June 5—Assembly Sunday was a notable day in the church of Halifax. The pulpits of the Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist and Universalist Churches of the city were occupied by visiting ministers. The weather was of June brightness with a nip of tonic in the air, and very large congregations attended all the services, notably at St. Matthew's in the morning, where Rev. Dr. Charles W. Gordon of Winnipeg (Ralph Connor) was the Assembly preacher and at St. Andrew's in the morning where Rev. Dr. W. T. Herdige, of St. Andrew's, Ottawa, preached to a congregation which overflowed the pew accommodation at the aisles. The Assembly preacher at the evening service at St. Matthew's was Rev. J. M. Millar, B. D., of Strathcona. The preachers of the day represented all sections of the dominion, thus imparting to the services a special Canadian significance.

RIOT COSTS YALE MEN \$184.

NEW HAVEN, Ct., June 5—The Yale scientific school students, who were arrested for taking part in a riot, so called, at Savin Rock, last Tuesday night, went to the Westhaven town court today and jointly contributed a total of \$184 in fines, costs and property damages.

NO TROUBLE AT NANKING

NANKING, China, June 5—Notwithstanding recent threats that a revolutionary movement would be inaugurated today, the date set for the opening of the Exposition, this ceremony was carried out without the slightest disorder. While the foreigners have been warned not to interfere in any way with the military preparations, this warning has not served to alarm them to any extent, and Chinese merchants who a few days ago were leaving the city are now returning. The situation is not considered serious.

Some Fertilizer FACTS

To many farmers in Canada today, all fertilizers, be they nitrogenous, phosphatic or potassic, are simply known as "phosphates," for the reason that phosphatic fertilizers were the first introduced, just as in Scotland any kind of fertilizer was known as "Guanu," because the latter was one of the first forms of commercial fertilizer which came into use there.

Bear in mind Liebig's "Law of Minimum." viz., "The substance in minimum rules the crop," which means that the plant-food substances present in the soil in smallest quantity will determine the amount of crop which can be grown on that soil. For instance, if the soil is deficient in either one of the three essentials (nitrogen, potash or phosphoric acid), then, no matter how much of the other two ingredients were applied, minimum yields could not be obtained, since this is only possible when the plant's appetite for each essential has been satisfied. Another way of expressing the above mentioned law is, "The strength of the chain is that of its weakest link."

If a farmer wishes to fatten a bullock, he does not reason thus: "Well, straw is cheap, and water doesn't cost anything, I'll give the bullock all the straw he can drink until he is fat." No, the feeder knows that straw and water do not contain all the essential elements required to fatten a bullock; although straw or hay is a valuable part of the diet, he knows that other materials are necessary in order to produce a fat bullock. Then, why does not he exercise the same judgment in the case of his plants, for the same law holds good in both the plant and animal kingdom?
