Livestock

MONTEAL, March 22 (CP)—Receipts on Montreal livestock market today were 77 cattle, 559 calves, and 464 hogs. Cattle and hogs were unchanged while calves were steady to 25 cents lower in spots. There were no early sales of cattle. The bulk of the calves were of common to just fair quality. There were no tops. One lot of 57 calves, averaging 143 pounds, made \$7.50 with fair calves around \$6.50. Common to just fair quality in mixed lots were sold at \$6.20. Very common light veals sold down to \$5. Bacon hogs were steady at \$9.75 fed and watered. Selects drew \$1 per hog premium. Butchers were \$2.25 per head and kitchen hogs were \$2.50 per head. Extra hogs were \$2.50 to \$2 per cwt. Sows were \$2.50 to \$2. Hogs sold on rail grade brought \$13.35 sold weight. On Maritime markets rail grade hogs advanced 40 cents to \$12.40 hot weight. Live grade hogs advanced 30 cents to \$9.15 off trucks. Sows were steady, selling at \$7.00 dressed weight and \$5.65 off trucks. Choice steers sold up to \$7.25, good \$6.50, medium \$6.75, fair \$6.25, common \$4.00. Choice heifers were quoted at \$6.50, good \$6.00, medium \$5.25, fair \$4.75 and common \$4.00. Top cows were \$6.00, good cows \$4.75, medium \$4.25, fair \$3.25 to \$3.75. Canners and cutters were \$2.50 to \$3.25. Common bulls were \$3.00 to \$3.25 and butcher bulls \$3.25 to \$4.25.

Produce Prices Prices Tumble On Montreal Market

MONTEAL, March 22 (CP)—Stock market prices tumbled today as Memel's session to Germany knocked the props from under yesterday's rally. Leaders dropped fractions to three points in the brisk selling which followed the new turn in European events. Prominent in the general retreat were Bell Telephone, Canadian Car and Steel, and National Steel Car and Steel of Canada each two lower. Much of the selling pressure was turned on the metal section, and nickel back down 1-4 while Noranda and Hudson Bay Mining dropped a point each. In rally Canadian Car common fell 1-4. Canadian Car preferred, C. P. R. and Cosco. Utilities followed the general trend and Quebec Power backedtracked a point while Brazilian slipped slightly. Outstanding in the paper list was Price Brothers, down 1-2 at 12 1-4. Total sales: 99,700 shares; industrial, 40,600; mines, 59,100; bonds, \$11,850.

WINNIPEG, March 22 (CP)—Firmness at Liverpool and a more favorable outlook in Europe political conditions brought appreciable gains to Winnipeg wheat futures prices today. Operations turned dull following the opening flurry but values held the advance to close 7-8-3-4 cent higher, with May at 61 3-8, July 61 7-8 and Oct. 62 1-8 cents. Wheat, Northern No. 1 70 3-8; barley, Canadian western No. 3 47 7-8; oats, feed, No. 1 37 3-8; flour, spring wheat patents, firsts 4.75; seconds 4.25; bakers 4.05; winter wheat patents, choice 2.95; white corn 4.60; bran, ton 23.25; shorts, ton 24.25; middlings, ton 26.25; rolled oats, bag, 80 lbs 2-35; hay, No. 2 59; carlots 10-1-11. Currencies

MONTEAL, March 22 (CP)—Pound Sterling declined 7-32 to 69 1-2 on Montreal foreign exchange today and the United States dollar eased 1-32 to 1.00 1-2. French francs followed the trend and closed 7-32 lower at 2-66 5-32. NEW YORK, March 22 (AP)—Foreign exchange markets remained tense today as Germany continued to expand her territory. With major European monies held in check, however, by operation of various control funds, changes in terms of the United States dollar were narrow. An outstanding exception was the Swiss franc, a drop of .00 1-2 of a cent set it at a new low for the year of 22.48 as the government still appeared unwilling to give official support. Sterling declined 1-8 of a cent to \$4.98 1-4 and the French franc to \$4.98 1-4 and the 3-4 franc to \$1.00 1-8 of a cent to 2.64 3-4. The belga was unchanged and the guilder down .01 of a cent. Canadian funds were 1-32 better at 12 1-2. Lake Shore and McIntyre sold in considerable volume at losses of 1-4.
