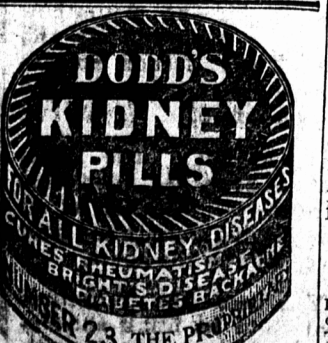

Short addresses will be given by Hon. E. H. Armstrong of the council of public instruction; Dr. A. H. Mackay, superintendent of education; Dr. Edward Blackadder, chairman of the school board; Lieutenant-Colonel J. W. Vitto, officer commanding 63rd regiment, and others. The public are cordially invited to the present and make these demonstrations worthy of the occasion.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL MADE IT EMBARRASSING.**

VICTORIA, B. C., Sept. 7.—Attorney-General Campbell, of Manitoba, caused some embarrassment last night at the brilliant forestry banquet which was attended by several prominent Americans, by stating that "nations must stand by their treaties and obligations." A large section of the banqueters broke into excited and prolonged cheering, but at the head table, where E. T. Allen, the official representative of the forestry branch of the United States government at Washington sat to the right of President Henry and Sir Richard McBride, there was an awkward silence.

**U. S. PAPER MAKERS TO INVADE CANADA.**

UTICA, N. Y., Sept. 7.—According to an announcement here, first steps have been taken for the biggest invasion of Canada by United States paper makers that has yet occurred. Articles of incorporation for the Domacoma Paper Company have been filed at Ottawa.

The incorporators are G. H. P. Gould, president of the Gould Paper Company of Lyons, Pa., N. Y., and of the St. Regis Paper Company of New York state; Charles F. Rogers, bank president and W. N. Kernan of Utica. The capitalization is \$3,500,000.

**THE OUTLOOK FOR RAILROAD SHARES.**

A summary of the net earnings of the railroads of the United States for the fiscal year, ending June 30th, shows a material decrease in net earnings. Many causes throughout the past year contributed to this condition. The most important factor was the increase in employees' wages which expanded operating expenses. The outlook for the present year is not so bright as last year's, but the factors which caused last year's decrease, in making such a comparison it is plain that the railroads can expect a material increase in tonnage because of a general improvement in commercial business and a large agricultural yield. Taken as a whole it would seem fair to estimate that railroad net earnings this year will be larger than the year just past. Seasoned dividend paying stock like Pennsylvania-O. & N. W., Northern Pacific—Great Northern, Pfd.—Baltimore & Ohio—Atchafalaya—Southern Pacific and Southern Ry. Pfd. are all worthy of the investor's consideration on any material decline in price between now and the middle of October.

**OIL PLANT ON FIRE.**

ROCHESTER, Sept. 7.—Sparks set fire to the plant of the Monroe county oil plant here and a series of explosions followed, blowing the dome off an 8,000 gallon tank of benzine and destroying other tanks. Firemen are fighting the blaze. About 32,000 gallons of benzine are burning, and the loss will be heavy.

**NEW ZEALAND ADDS ANOTHER VICTORY.**

TORONTO, Sept. 7.—New Zealand added another victory yesterday, defeating Australia in the finals of the tug-of-war, winning two out of three pulls. The contest illustrated the high standard of sportsmanship of the Australians, for, according to the regulations, only one team could be entered by any one country. New Zealand entered two and Australia defeated the second New Zealand team in a preliminary.

**MONEY.**

Washington, Sept. 7.—After experimenting for several months with monkeys, Dr. John F. Anderson and Dr. Joseph Goldberger, of the Government hygienic laboratory in Washington, have made several important discoveries regarding measles. A common belief that the scales of dried particles of the skin of the child, which rub off during adolescence are dangerous is shattered by the findings of the two physicians. Heretofore experts have tried to infect animals with measles in order to method of combating epidemics, but have failed so completely that it was thought the germ was harmless to the lower animals. It remained for these members of the Public Health Service to accomplish this infection and open the way to a quicker conquest of this childhood malady.

**A HYDROPHOBIA VICTIM DIES.**

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 7.—After a long and painful struggle, a young man with five strong men who held him, Christopher Eastin, 40 years old, died at his home here from hydrophobia. At his bedside stood his women, each of whom believed herself to be Eastin's wife. To each the dying man confessed that he had for several years led a double life and begged forgiveness.

**THE STOCK MARKET.**

The trend of prices continues to depend upon financial conditions more than all other factors combined. This was exemplified by the equanimity with which the result of the Vermont election was accepted. The tendency of the market can be attributed to but one factor, viz: the rates for money; and because the demand for money bids fair to continue throughout September it seems highly probable that prices will work lower. The market has already discounted the splendid agricultural prospects. There is no apparent source from which favorable stock market news might emanate.

**PARIS.**

PARIS, Sept. 7.—After strangling a homeless woman whom he had enticed to his home, an elderly mechanic named Alfred Mangot, who was known to be a semi-lunatic, decided to burn down the house to conceal his crime. He soaked rags in petroleum, and poured petroleum on the bed where his victim lay, and just before six in the morning he set fire to the place. A workman noticed smoke issuing from between the shutters and called out fire! The firemen arrived before Mangot could make his escape. Believing the flat deserted the firemen forced an entry, and found the partially burned corpse on the flaming bed.

**A TRAGEDY OF PARIS.**

A policeman named Rollet realized that Mangot must still be in the building and commenced a search. He treated to the cellars, and he obtained a lighted lamp. When he was at the foot of the staircase five shots resounded. The lamp which he was holding at arm's length, was shattered by the first bullet; the other four were fired in the darkness. Rollet groped his way up the stairs to obtain another light. By the time this was secured several other policemen had arrived, and the squad descended together, carrying bucklers, as were employed in the siege of the motor bandit's stronghold at Choisy a few months ago. These, however, were unnecessary, for Mangot had hanged himself, and his dead body was found dangling behind the cellar door.
