Harris' Homer In 11th Inning Gives Tigers 4-1 Victory Over Yankees

NEW YORK, June 10—(AP)—New York Yankees a home run into the rightfield stands with two men on base in the 11th inning today to give Detroit Tigers a 4-1 triumph over New York Yankees and seal the spotlight for several other noteworthy efforts.

One of the players from whom attention was distracted was Harris' teammate, Roger (Doc) Cramer, who had three singles to bring his lifetime total of hits to 2,000 and enter a select group of hitters that includes only six others now active in the major leagues. In previous major league history 75 players have made 2,000 or more hits and of these only one is still playing are Paul Waner of Boston Braves, only four hits from his 3,000 goal, Lloyd Waner of the Phils, Mel Ott of New York Giants, Jimmie Foxx, newly acquired by Chicago Cubs, Joe Cronin of Boston Red Sox and Charley Getzinger, coach and pinch hitter for the Tigers.

All of these players have been in service longer than Cramer, who is in his 14th season and came to Detroit last winter after playing with Philadelphia Athletics, the Red Sox and Washington Senators. He has made 64 hits this season.

Cubs Whip Phils 5-2

CHICAGO, June 10—(AP)—Usually a Cub nemesis, Johnny Podgajny was just that for six innings while the pitched no-hit baseball today, but something happened in the seventh and before the smoke cleared Chicago had five runs—enough to beat the Phils 5-2.

During the seventh-inning uprising the Cubs bunched four hits, three off Podgajny and another off Ike Pearson, who came in to clean up the mess.

But it was during Pearson's regime that Stanley Hack delivered the blow that cleared the bases and gave the Cubs their margin of victory.

By pitching an eight-hit performance, Bill Lee managed to win his eighth victory of the season. Podgajny allowed only four men to reach first base during the first six innings. Two got there on a walk, another as a hit batsman and the fourth on an error by Nick Etten.

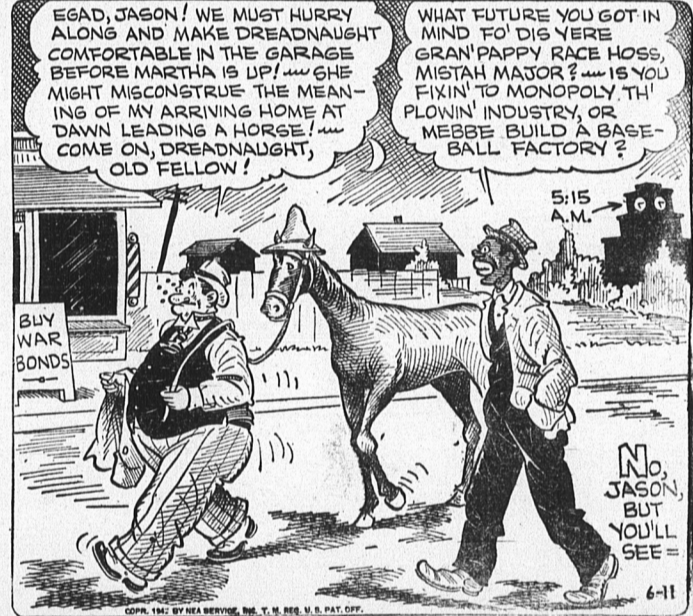

fishing village last Sunday evening.

Most of the clothing had been stripped from her body, the head was battered and the body was partly hidden under moss.

Police revealed that Sgt. Hutchings, stationed at Pennfield, N.B., had been on this side of the Atlantic for about two months.

The information charging murder was laid by Detective Staff Sergeant Davis of Royal Canadian Mounted Police Divisional Headquarters at Fredericton. He had led the investigation almost unceasingly since discovery of the body.

R.C.M.P. Corporal Tudor made the arrest.

Miss Connors, attractive brunette daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Connors, was a granddaughter of the late Lewis Connors, who founded the widely known fish canning industry here. She had been employed at the plant.

Police made no statement regarding their investigation leading to the arrest. An autopsy was performed by Dr. Arnold Branch, Saint John, provincial pathologist, and the result of this will be included among evidence to be presented at an inquest here next Tuesday night.

The young woman had been missing since she left the regular weekly dance at the community hall here Friday night. At her home it was believed she was staying with friends whom she frequently visited and who, consequently, it was not until Sunday night that she was actually known to be missing.

Discovery of the body was made by a searching party led by D. P. Guptill, chief of police here. He first found one of her shoes near the field, off Dead Man's Harbor Road. A few minutes later he located the body.

The spot was a considerable distance from both the dance hall and her home and in the opposite direction from her home, in relation to the dance hall.

Police maintained reticence during the investigation, particularly at the outset, and it was not until Monday that it became publicly known, outside of Black's Harbor, that a body had been found.

Much of the police work comprised questioning of persons in the Bay's Harbor and Pennfield districts.

Nazis Wipe Out Czech Village

LONDON, June 10—(CP)—German vengeance squads utterly wiped out Lidice, a Czech village of 1,200 persons today, killing all the men and deporting the women and children on the ground that the population harbored the two assassins of Reinhard Heydrich, the late German ruler of Bohemia-Moravia.

Completing this most savage single act of repression in the history of German occupation of continental Europe, Gestapo and German soldiery razed the village, leaving nothing but rubble, the German-controlled radio announced from Prague.

Lidice is—or was—a village of coal-miners and woodworkers a few miles west of the Czech capital and not far from where Heydrich "the hangman" was fatally wounded by two patriots while driving along a winding road two weeks ago.
