DUCHESS OF YORK
LIKES THE MANNEQUINS

LONDON, March 29.—(By the Canadian Press)—At the British Industries Fair some of the high lights, statistically speaking, were: \$30,000 worth of orders for one dress goods manufacturing firm; \$25,000 order from Holland and Denmark for electric cookers; \$5,000 order for ladies dress goods hitherto supplied entirely by Germany; 60,000 articles made from waste yarn sold by one firm. Among the novelties at Olympia are: New brands of Empire bromides—from the Dead Sea—previously a German monopoly; women's handbags made of tripe; rotary toothbrush worked off a water tap; flexible gramophone records, which play for 18 minutes; cigarette case con-

taining a first-aid outfit; one horse-power meat mincer; triangular razor.
 "Now I realize this is the right way to show a gown," said the Duchess of York, when she watched the mannequins—20 of them, showing more than 700 gowns, as they walked down the platform in the primrose and mauve theatre, at the White City section of the fair. She admired what the trade calls the "modeling," the hips and raised shoulder, the few professional movements which more than all else show a gown to advantage. She gave an order for material for a coat at the Scottish Woolen Manufacturers Association. The Duchess admired the new cotton fabric Raytex, displayed at the Dorcas stand, and expressed satisfaction when told it was all cotton.

THE FLOWER-POTS, GEORGIAN BAY ISLANDS, NATIONAL PARK

One of the engineering works carried out by the National Parks of Canada, Department of the Interior, was the re-enforcing of the base of the smaller of the two natural columns or "flower-pots" on Flower Pot Island in Georgian bay, Ontario. Flower Pot Island was recently acquired as an addition to the Georgian Bay Islands National Park from the Department of Indian Affairs, who had held it in trust since its surrender in 1856 by the Chippewa Indians.

The island owes its name to an interesting rock formation which takes the form of two picturesque limestone pillars which stand in bold relief against the lake horizon like two immense flower-pots on the edge of the water. The larger of the two has a height of about forty-five feet and a diameter of twenty feet. The smaller pillar is only twenty-five feet high and about fifteen feet through.
 The waves and ice of Georgian bay have been slowly wearing away the bases of these pillars and the disintegration at the foot of the smaller flower-pot is now quite marked. Having an overhang of six feet, caused by erosion and lean, this pillar required immediate attention, and it was deemed advisable to strengthen the base with concrete. This was effected by pouring cement into the fissures of the rock and then building up the face with loose stone, thereby helping to preserve the natural appearance of the column. The larger pillar is still in very good condition with moss growing up the sides and rear, indicating a much slower rate of erosion than in the case of the smaller pillar.

CANADIAN MOUNTAIN PEAKS

The southern portion of the boundary between British Columbia and Alberta is the crest of the Rocky mountains. It does not necessarily follow, however, that the highest peaks are on this watershed line. This is illustrated on the Mistaya map sheet of the National Topographic series issued by the Topographical Survey, Department of the Interior, where a number of peaks including Mounts Forbes, Hector, and Willingdon are all higher than any peak actually on the watershed.

Cecil B. DeMille's M-G-M production, "The Squaw Man," which opened yesterday at the Prince Edward Theatre, presents admirably in talking picture form one of the three most successful plays the American stage has known. The other two are "Ben Hur" and "Uncle Tom's Cabin."

N. S. Legislature
Discuss Bills

(Canadian Press)
 HALIFAX, N. S., April 1.—The second division of the session was called in the Nova Scotia Legislature this afternoon when the House defeated by a straight party vote of 18 to 15, the bill introduced by R. W. E. Landry, (Liberal, Yarmouth), which sought to prevent any member of the legislature being paid for other services to the province. The bill, an amendment to the Act governing powers and privileges of the House, was defeated on second reading after a brisk discussion.
 Premier Harrington said he was in accord with the principle of the measure; so far as the government was concerned it was desirable to keep members from receiving money from the Province. He could not agree to certain particular terms of the bill. However, he moved the hoist.

Pure Seed Bill Before N. S. Legislature

HALIFAX, N. S., April 1.—A bill to advance the growing of "pure" seed by the establishment of variety zones was introduced in the Nova Scotia Legislature yesterday by Hon. O. P. Goucher, Minister of Agriculture. The measure had been recommended by the N. S. Farmers' Association, on the ground that serious danger existed of root and vegetable seeds crossing when grown near together. The bill precludes the growing of other than pure seeds in districts where cross pollination might result.
