**LOCAL PROHIBITION IN TEXAS.**—Very interesting statistics of prohibition and crime are reported from Texas, where the local option law assures that prohibition of the saloons shall be enacted only when it can be enforced by public sentiment. There are in that state twenty-three prohibition counties that have no convicts in the penitentiary, and nine with only one convict each. In thirty-nine prohibition counties there are only twenty-three convicts in all. San Jacinto County alone, with a population of 10,227 and the open saloon, has twenty-five convicts, and Montgomery, with open saloons and 17,007 population, has twenty-one convicts in the state prison; and there are two poor counties in the piney woods—Collin county, with 50,000 people and no saloons, has twenty convicts; Lamar county with 48,000 and saloons, has 96. A large part of Texas has no saloons, and has one convict in 1,500 of population, while the territory with saloons has one convict for every 500 of population. Such figures teach a lesson.

The program which opened with Scots Wha Hae and closed with Auld Lang Syne was Scotch to the core and was received with fine enthusiasm. The singing, with Miss Laura Houson as accompanist and by such well known favorites as Mr. Miller, R. W. Stevenson, Elden McKay, Miss Jennie Stevenson, Miss Muriel Bradshaw and Miss Ethel Read showed a wide knowledge of Burns' songs, judicious selection, careful practice and well deserved the enthusiastic reception given to it. The recitation and readings from A. Moffatt, Miss McKenna, C. A. Stevenson, Miss Ethel Read and George Smith were all given in capital taste and spirit calling forth much merited applause. The address was given by Rev. George Millar.—"Burns was the mount in peak of Scottish genius. Who could do justice to it? While it took the genius of Burns to set forth the greatness of the great ones who preceded him in Scotland's annals, who can be expected to tell the secret of his own marvellous powers. He laid Scotland under tribute by making its dialect a classic tongue. He laid humanity under tribute by revealing its true sources of mirth and its profoundest springs for tears." The celebration was held under the auspices of the New Glasgow Literary Society and the proceeds will be used in adding new books to the growing public library.
