compulsory clause be inserted in the School Act enforcing midsummer vacation. He next pointed out the advantages of consolidation, how it is calculated to increase the efficiency of our school system, the prejudice against its introduction in many of the country school districts and proffered suggestion radicalizing them. He also touched on the advantage of non-attendance of the pupils in the majority of the schools, which fact is apparent to all; and in this connection he advocated a stronger clause in the Public Schools Act regarding compulsory attendance. He spoke of the inadequacy of Normal Training given at P. W. College and in concluding Topics, he dealt with the value of Nature Study, and our earnest exhortation to realize the nobility of their calling and the great opportunity presented to them of moulding the characters of the future citizens of our fatherland.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The first number on the program for afternoon session was a paper on Home Missionary Changes in our Educational System, given by D. S. Walker. He showed that our schools under the present system was not up to the requirements of the people in so far as no training is given the pupils in Agriculture, Nature Study and Manual Labor. He stated that under existing conditions it is impossible to have these subjects properly taught in our schools and suggested that the only means of acquiring a practical knowledge in these subjects can be obtained by consideration. The paper was discussed by President Bennet, Inspector Matthews and P. F. Hughes. A vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Hughes for his practical and suggestive paper.

This was followed by an address by Dr. Anderson. He paid a high tribute to the excellent work that is being done in the First Class schools of Prince Co. He endorsed the President's remarks respecting holidays and stated that there is not a member of the Board of Education who is not in entire sympathy with summer vacation. He said that laxity is practised respecting spring and fall holidays as

many pupils do not attend for three weeks in May and the month of June. Rate payers should understand the loss is sustained by teachers and pupils in retaining the antiquated system of holidays. He also insisted that teachers use their endeavors in explaining this disadvantage to the rate payers, which might influence the adoption of midsummer holidays. He dealt in succession with the importance of well articulated and distinct reading, accurate spelling, and the necessity of pupils understanding what they read. Valuable suggestions were given in regard to teaching Geography.

In conclusion he emphasized the importance of developing the faculties of observations and attention. A vote of thanks was then tendered Dr. Anderson for his suggestive and instructive address.

REGISTRATION OF BIRTHS, DEATHS AND MARRIAGES

For the purposes of the Act for Registration of Births, Deaths and Marriages, the Province has been divided into the following Districts and the undermentioned persons have been appointed District Registrars of Births and Deaths for the several Districts.

Deaths occurring in Charlottetown, Summerside and Georgetown, must be registered before burial. Deaths occurring in other Districts must be registered within Seven (7) days of their occurrence.

Births must be registered within Thirty (30) days of their occurrence.

Every duly qualified medical practitioner who was last in attendance, during the last illness of any person, shall within Forty-eight hours after having notice or knowledge of the death of such person, transmit by Post, prepaid to the District Registrar of the District in which the death took place, a Certificate under his signature, of the cause of death according to the form in "Schedule B" to this Act annexed, to be provided by the said District Registrar, and it shall be the duty of every such Medical Practitioner to apply to the said District Registrar for blank forms for that purpose.

Any person who knowingly or wilfully makes or causes to be made, any false statement touching any of the particulars required to be reported and entered under this Act, shall upon conviction thereof forfeit a sum not exceeding Forty (40) dollars.

If any Householder, head of a family, Clergyman, Physician, or other person or persons required by this Act to report Births, Deaths, and Marriages refuses or wilfully neglects to do so within the time named, shall upon conviction for each and every offence forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Twenty (20) Dollars and costs.

The fees required to be paid to the District Registrars under this Act, for registration of Births and Deaths are paid by the Provincial Government.

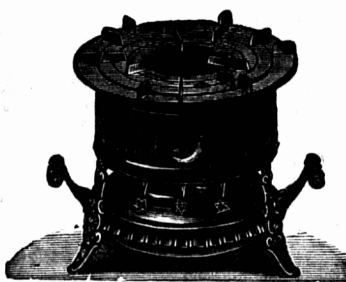
