Senators cut Loose against White Sox

NEW YORK, Aug. 27—(AP)—The Senators in the cellar of the American League, cut loose with a barrage of extra-base hits today to defeat the second-place White Sox, 11-3 in Chicago.

Pounding out 18 hits for 27 bases, the Senators drove Johnny Rigney from the mound in the fifth inning and continued to vent their wrath against Jack Hallett. Four Chicago errors, including one by each of the outfielders, assisted the Washington field day.

Led by outfielder Jeff Heath who drove home seven runs with two homers and a triple, the Indians jumped back into the winning column at Cleveland with an 11-4 victory over Philadelphia.

The Tribesmen collected 18 hits

off the Athletics' Tom Ferriok to equal their biggest offensive of the season.

At Detroit, the Tigers, after dropping their last two games, juggled their lineup for today's opener with Boston Red Sox and coupled with the wildness of Jack Wilson the move paid off with a 6-3 victory.

TRURO, N.S., Aug. 27—(CP)—Pitching three-hit ball, Albert Linkletter, Springhill Miners' ace twirler, shutout Truro 3-0 in a game scheduled for the Nova Scotia Senior Baseball Mainland semi-final.

CHICAGO, Aug. 27—(AP)—The Boston-Washington game of Aug. 15 which rained ended in the eighth inning with the Senators in front 6-3 will go down in the books as a Boston victory for forfeit, under a ruling announced today by President William Harridge of the American League.

Harridge held that the Washington club violated a rule which provides that the home team must have a groundkeeper and assistants on hand and under control of the umpires.

The report to Harridge said that umpires were unable to find the ground crew and that failure to cover the field with canvas made resumption of play impossible.

Manager Joe Cronin of the Red Sox protested and President Harridge upheld the protest and awarded the game to Boston.
