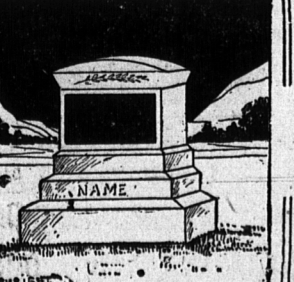

He is quoted as saying that the prisons are filled, chiefly with women and children, convicted of having stolen food, while housewives are afraid to go shopping for food, even in the principal streets, owing to robberies and assaults.
