### BEET CULTURE.

From time to time to time the enormous growth of the beet sugar industry in Germany, France, the United States and other countries has led to the inquiry whether sugar beets might be profitably grown on our own fertile Island. This question is now approaching a solution. A wealthy New York syndicate is behind the movement, and has this year supplied seed and caused a small quantity of sugar beets to be grown at a number of different points in this Province. Be it observed that there is no question in regard to the growth of the sugar beet here. That they can be grown is an undoubted fact. The point to be determined is whether the beets grown on our soil and under our climate will contain the required percentage of sugar to make the industry profitable one. This will be demonstrated within the near future by the tests of the beets actually grown on the Island this year.

Should the tests have a favorable result, as we trust may prove to be the case, the way will be prepared for the establishment in our midst of an industry that may fully rival in importance the present splendid cheese industry which has been of so great advantage and profit to our farmers. For a large acreage will in that case be required to be devoted to the growth of sugar beets, and a large and costly factory will be needed to convert them into sugar.

We learn from Mr. A. Callaghan, who is promoting the movement, that the New York syndicate, in the event of this year's tests of the beets grown proving satisfactory, propose to purchase 2,000 acres of land to be devoted to beet culture. In addition they will require two or three thousand acres to be devoted to the same purpose by farmers, or private land-owners, so as to make a total supply of 75,000 tons of beets. The factory would employ some 200 hands besides the skilled labor, and would need in its operations some 7,000 tons of coal, and 5,000 tons of lime annually.

If the tests prove satisfactory the proposed company will take all the risks, undertaking to pay the farmers a fixed rate for all the sugar beets they can grow, and at which they can be grown profitably from seed supplied and under instructions as to their cultivation. It will be most fortunate if we can have so great an industry established in our Island with the risk entirely taken by capital from outside invested in our midst. It is understood that the company will undertake to pay \$4 per ton for the beets supplied them, and that a yield of 15 to 20 tons per acre can be counted upon under favorable conditions.

Behind the movement lies the question of a bounty, either by the Dominion or Provincial Government. The beet sugar industry has been heavily bonused in France, Germany and Austro-Hungary, as well as by a number of the American States. This raises a question upon which there will be a wide difference of opinion but, of course, if the company received a bounty on their sugar they could afford to pay a higher price to the farmer for beets. We need not here discuss this question, but THE GUARDIAN will watch the further progress of the movement with great interest.

THE GUARDIAN has been informed by a resident of York that at various times three patients from the Lunatic Hospital have been seen in that vicinity wandering about. But inasmuch as we cannot well have two governments in power at the same time, and cannot have sweeping majorities on both sides, THE GUARDIAN reluctantly concludes that there is a mistake in the calculations somewhere. We shall not need to wait a great while to learn on which side the error lies.

Mr. Chamberlain has cabled the satisfaction of the Imperial Government on learning that the men of the Canadian Regiment are to be warmly welcomed home. The Colonial Secretary's despatch to Lord Minto mentions that "their splendid services in South Africa have won the admiration and gratitude of the whole Empire, and the memory of their indomitable courage and resolution will ever live in the annals of the British army." These are warm words of praise from a very exalted source, and what is best of all the tribute has been honestly and bravely earned.
