French Cabinet Headed By Briand Is Overthrown

PARIS, Oct. 23—The French cabinet, headed for the eleventh time by Aristide Briand, was overthrown in the Chamber of Deputies last night less than three months after it had appeared before parliament and asked for "a three months truce" in internal politics in order to face the problems of The Hague reparation conference with security at home.

The defeat of the government coming with astounding effect on the first day of parliament's reunion was brought about by the vote of the Radical Socialists, the Socialists and the Right Wing group, led by Louis Marin, Minister of Pensions, in a former Poincare government.

It came over the demand of these parties for immediate discussion of Foreign affairs, including especially the decision taken at The Hague conference, the question of the evacuation of the Rhineland, and the negotiations between France and Germany on the Saar Valley.

M. Briand, who wished to postpone this discussion until November posed the question of confidence, staking the life of the government on the rejection of the demand. The opposition proved too strong for his dwindling majority, weakened during the past few days by internal dissension.

President Doumergue will consult all leaders of all political parties, the presidents of the Senate and of the Chamber, and other important personalities tomorrow. This is in accordance with unvaried political usage in France. Then he must settle down to the business of finding a new head for the government. It is therefore unlikely that the cabinet crisis can be solved before late tomorrow or Thursday.

Mr. Dewar declared enthusiastically.

aged to bring the crew of the Neesen safely to shore. Meanwhile, the ship, still hard and fast aground, is reported to be breaking up in the heavy sea. Another act of heroism was the gallant attempt made by the crew of the tug Barrellton to rescue six men aboard the barge, Lake Frugality, which had broken away from the tug last night. For hours, in a mountainous sea, which at times almost smothered the tug, the tiny vessel circled the barge, finally losing it in the dark. The barge drifted ashore near Point Au Sable, and the crew is safe. Meanwhile, the gallant little tug is missing. Search has failed to reveal its whereabouts and it is feared that it sank. Eight miles west of DeTour, on Gravel Island, the steamer William B. Pilkey, piled up. Her crew of 25 men is still aboard the wrecked steamer, unable to take to the boats because of the terrific sea, which is still running. The steamer is reported to be in great danger of being broken up, as the waves are washing completely over her decks.
