FOUR DROWNED MANY MISSING IN STORM

Freak Storm Takes Toll of Life Off Atlantic City.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Aug. 20.—At least four persons were known to have drowned and many more were missing after a freak storm swept the coast between here and Cape May late today. The early list of dead: Theodore Van Sant, 58, fishing boat skipper. "Soph" Bruner of Marmora, also a skipper. Wilbur Lukens of Philadelphia. Harry R. Smith of Camden. All of the four were aboard boats that were struck by the wind, said to have been of hurricane force. In addition, the Goldie R., a cabin cruiser that had started from Jobs Point with four persons as passengers, was wrecked and the passengers were believed missing and at least three that were aboard the Anna M., an auxiliary fishing boat, were believed drowned. Many other craft, large and small, that had started from Ocean City and Absecon Inlet, had not returned back tonight.

Machado To Visit Canada

NASSAU, Bahama Islands, Aug. 20.—(A.P.)—An aide to former President Machado of Cuba today said it was possible the party would leave here for Canada next Sunday. Previous statements had said Machado would go direct to the United States and join his family in Philadelphia.

Parades Pass Quietly In Irish Free State

DUBLIN, Irish Free State, Aug. 20.—While uneasiness existed throughout the Irish Free State, Sunday passed in comparative quiet and headquarters here of the newly formed Blue Shirt National Guard asserted tonight that parades had been held as arranged throughout the country. It was learned that instructions were issued to the police to give the fullest possible protection to the "Blue Shirts." The minor incidents, however, indicated the existing tension.

He managed to walk a short distance to his home, but died later in Bridgewater Hospital of internal injuries.
