IN MEMORIAM

MRS. CATHERINE SMITH

There passed away to her eternal reward on Sunday, the 6th day of June 1943, Mrs. Catherine Smith of Middleton, P. E. Island, widow of the late Thomas Smith. Mrs. Smith died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Stephen Johnston, who tenderly cared for her during her last illness. The deceased had been in failing health for some months prior to her death, but her disposition to be cheerful and to make light of her ills, lest she cause worry to those about her, had led her family to believe her condition less serious than it was, so that the end came as a considerable shock to all.

Mrs. Smith died as she had consistently lived—in peace with her God, whom she had so faithfully served in life, and in perfect reconciliation to His holy will. "The will be done" was the constant prayer of her saintly soul. The funeral to St. Malachias Church, Kinkora, was held in high esteem by all who knew her. Her courtesy and kindness, her thoughtfulness of the welfare of others, her religious devotion, above all her Christian humility endeared her to all about her. The deceased was comforted, during her final illness, by the last rites of the Catholic Church, administered by Father George McCabe, and the faithful pastor of Kinkora Church, besides, Father George McCabe, a nephew of the deceased, in his characteristic thoughtfulness and devotion to duty, was untiring in his efforts to bring comfort and solace to Mrs. Smith on her death-bed.

Coal Restrictions In Ont., Quebec

OTTAWA, July 15 — (CP) — Ontario and Quebec householders will be required to use high-volatile bituminous coal for 25 per cent of their "proved requirements" for the year in order to purchase the remaining 75 per cent in hard coal, the Manions Department announced today.

The new coal restrictions, designed to help prevent a coal famine next winter, are contained in an order issued by coal controller E. J. Brunning and affect all types of consumers of high-grade coal. Those who fail to take 25 per cent of their requirements in bituminous coal will not be allowed to purchase more than 50 per cent of their total proved requirements of hard coal for the year.

In the department's announcement Mr. Brunning said, Ontario and Quebec were the only provinces which depended almost entirely on United States coal.

"It is impossible to predict how much U.S. coal we will get this year," he said, referring to labor difficulties in the United States and the lateness of the navigation season on the Great Lakes.

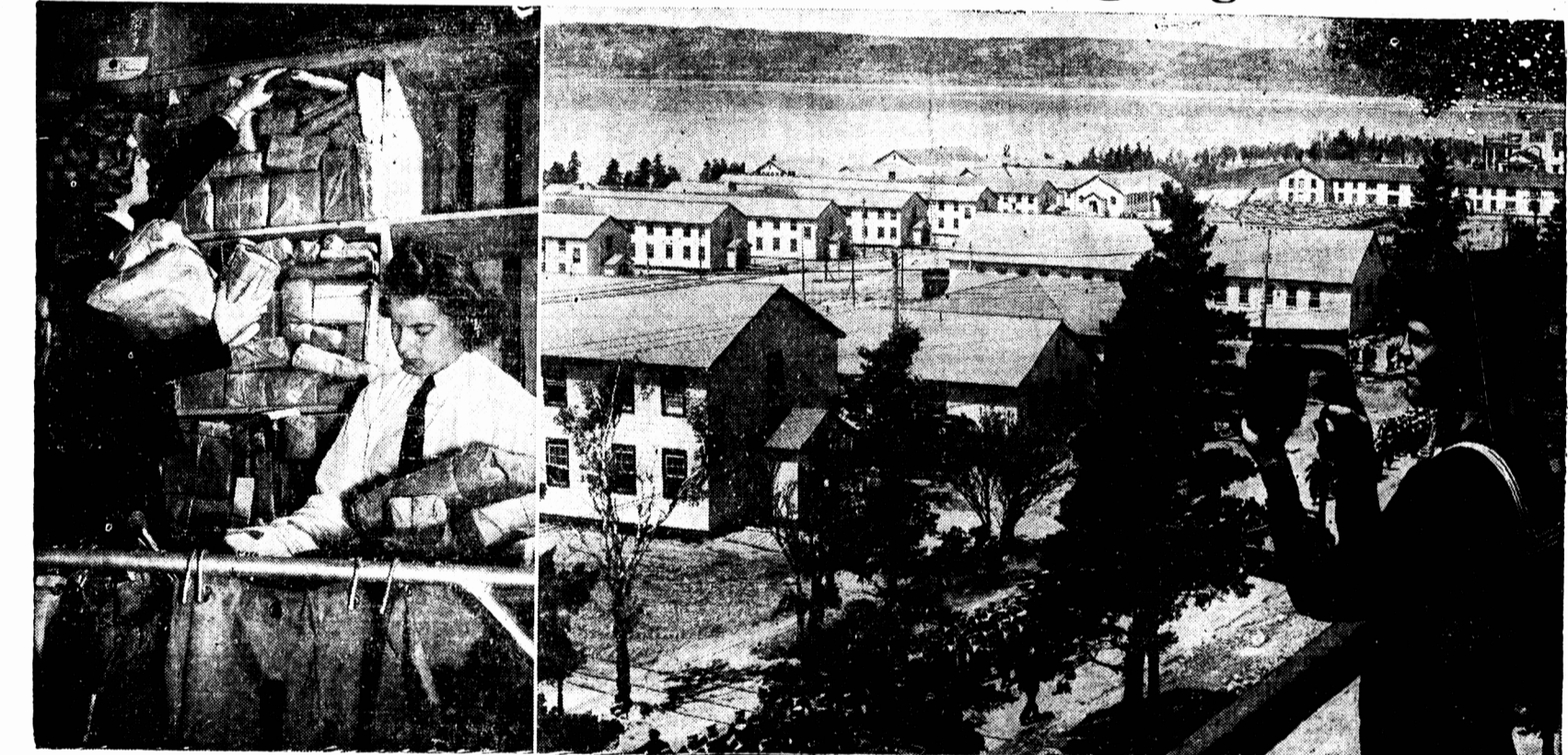
