The next charge against the prisoners was as follows:— On or about the 2nd day of Sept. a pair of reins and bridle were taken from the stable of Montague Pickett, Mt. Stewart, Montague Pickett swore as follows:

On the 2nd of Sept. I was in Charlottetown and got home about 6 p.m. I put the harness in the wagon and left the horse at hanging in the stable. Next morning I missed them.

The prisoners seemed to sit quite unconcerned about the matter but inwardly there seemed to be a deep consciousness of guilt.

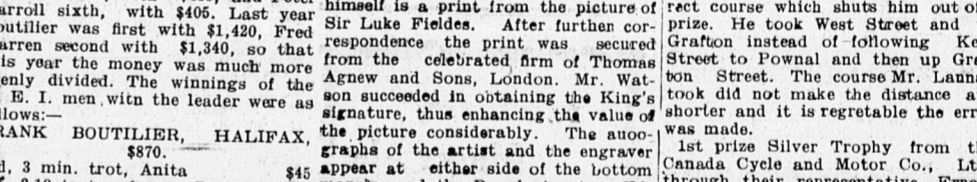
